
The conference committee is very active. We would like very much to have some volunteers to help with many tasks related to the upcoming WSGS State conference. Just let us know that you are available.

Noel Bourasaw, publisher of the Skagit River Journal of History & Folklore, will bring local history to life at a free presentation on Saturday, February 16, at 1:00 p.m. at the Concrete Senior Center. Learn about the East County area and the people, activities and industries that have made it unique. The presentation includes time for sharing photos, family history and scrapbooks, as well as time for questions and discussions.

Noel Bourasaw grew up in the Utopia district on the northern shore of the Skagit, near Minkler Lake, and was a 1962 graduate of Sedro-Woolley High School. He has helped write and edit several history books and magazines. He also collaborated with author Patricia McAndrew on a book soon to be published, Old Soldier Goes Fishing, about railroad boomer and New York Times columnist Frank Wilkeson, who lived in Skagit and Whatcom counties from 1885-1900.

His free website www.skagitriverjournal.com was launched in 2000 and has experienced an explosion of readership. The Journal passed two million page views in the fall of 2007, making the site one of the most-read history websites outside of Seattle. Books and some journals and magazines are being added to our library! Thank you to the members who are going through their collection of genealogical materials and setting some aside for our genealogy library. Also the family of

Carol Hertz George has donated books from her collection that they thought would be useful to the Society. They all happen to be written by George K. Schweitzer, PhD. Sc.D. - New York Genealogical Research, Indiana Genealogical Research, and Massachusetts Genealogical Research. Each book has a similar format: history, maps and geography is followed by types of records ie. Bible, Biographies, Cemetery, Court, Vital Records etc. Record locations are then followed by the county listings. Civil War Genealogy is also included in the gift and will be replaced by the older copy that has been in our collection.

The magazines and journals added are:

Early American Life, various issues from 1977 & 1978, one issue contained an interesting article on making applehead dolls;

Kentucky Ancestors and the Register of the Kentucky Historical Society, both quarterlies from 1991 to 1993. Both include historical information as well as current articles of that time.

Kansas History - A Journal of the Central Plains various issues 1992 -1998. Historical articles as well as then current book reviews; a typical article, "A Prayerful Public Protest", the significance of gender in the Kansas Woman's Crusade of 1874.

Journal of the American Historical Society of Germans from Russia, published in Lincoln, NE. Various issues from 2003 -2007 and a few newsletters from the same period. Many historical and human interest articles, one such was about how the Cossacks captured children and held them for ransom, the anguish of the families notwithstanding. These publications can offer information not always found in other sources.

Newspaper Research Tips

"Genealogy is not just a pastime; it's a passion."

Pam Walton of the Humble Area Genealogical Society recently presented a program titled "Getting the Most Out of that Newspaper" at Kingwood College in Kingwood, Texas. Here are some of her research tips, which I thought you might enjoy.

1. If you find an article abstracted from a newspaper, find the original source. The more times something is rewritten, the more removed it is from the original copy and the more prone it is to errors.

2. Request newspapers from other libraries by using interlibrary loan (ILL). Upon receipt, you will have a couple of weeks to examine it before returning it.

3. Expand research to neighboring communities and order more than one newspaper for the time-frame you are researching, since articles can differ drastically from paper to paper. For example, search newspapers from smaller and larger neighboring cities; they may have reported on the same event you are researching.

4. Order issues printed ten days prior to and ten days after an event, since certain items have follow-ups. For example, a death notice, funeral notice, burial notice, and obituary would be published on different days and would include different data. 5. Watch for items frequently overlooked by researchers, such as juror lists and letters left in post offices, which indicate someone had left the area. Even advertisements can be useful; for example, you could learn about a family business.

6. Keep a research log to avoid duplicating your work. Some useful headings for your research log include the date you ordered or looked at the newspaper; the name of the paper; the names, dates, and items you are researching; your findings; and whether or not you made photocopies.

7. If possible, photocopy the whole page of the newspaper, including the title and date, even if this makes the article too small to read. Then, make an enlarged, readable copy of the article itself. Label everything on the back, including the name of the paper, the publication location and date, the volume, the page number, and the column.

8. Organize your copies carefully. One method is to create files for individual males' surnames, sorted alphabetically by the first name, and another set for females' married surnames, sorted the same way.[Columnist's recommendation: You can also keep a set with maiden names and cross-reference the files by including a sheet of paper that references the other file.]

9. Use Easybib.com or Elizabeth Shown Mills's book "Evidence Explained" to cite newspaper references properly in your family tree and other citations.
