GPS in Cemeteries

Try adding degrees of latitude and longitude when describing the location of a cemetery and obscure burial sites. Lat/Lon allows pinpointing locations within mere feet. It is especially helpful in finding an accurate location of grave sites in rural areas, many of which are unmarked, overgrown, abandoned, and may only contain one or two graves.

A handheld Global Positioning System (GPS) device can be purchased at a reasonable price. Pawn shops are a good source. They're simple and easy to use. Just turn them on at the site you want to record, and within a minute or so the degrees of lat/lon are displayed. Try it. Future generations will appreciate it.

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John "Jack" Royston Fisher

John Royston Fisher was born on August 26, 1917 in the Eagle Rock section of Los Angeles, California, an only child of Arthur "Jack" Fisher and Harriet Edith Prucha. He passed away at his home in Anacortes on September 8, 2009 with his family in attendance.



John attended the University of California at Davis, majoring in entomology. His college education was interrupted by World War II when he served with the Army Air Corps. He spent a year raising vegetable crops hydroponically on Ascension Island in the South Atlantic to feed the pilots of the U.S. Army Air Corps flying in Africa. Following the war he returned to UC Berkley to finish his degree. He then worked for 21 years for the Dow Chemical Company doing agricultural experimental work in the western states.

While stationed on the east coast he met and married Mary Constance Leeds in 1943 and together they had four children, Brian Keith Fisher, Diane Colleen Fisher, Lynn Kerry Fisher and Albert Royston Fisher. John and Mary divorced in 1958.

In 1959 he married Shirlee Dolores Weyer in Spokane, WA., and they celebrated their 50th wedding Anniversary in March of 2009.

In May 1984 they left for a sojourn of the world making many friends in numerous countries. Upon their return they settled in Anacortes. In 1988 they became extremely active members of the Skagit Valley Genealogical Society. John spent many years as an active board member serving in multiple capacities, i.e., president three terms, vice president, garage sale coordinator, Program Chair, Coordinator of the Funeral Home project, & Project Chair. As project chairperson he organized and coordinated the reading of ten (10) of the 15 major cemeteries in Skagit County. He is survived by his wife Shirlee, his four children and their families.

Vera Harpst Stuber, age 86, passed away August 31, 2009, in Kirkland, WA., where she resided at the Allancare Adult Care Home for the past 2½ years.

She was born March 3, 1923 in Richview, Illinois to Henry O. Harpst and Mary Everett Young, the youngest of three children. Vera moved to Skagit County in 1937 and was a graduate of Union High School in Sedro Woolley in 1940. She married Burl Stuber on September 14, 1941 in Renton and their early homes were in Sedro Woolley and Anacortes where they lived for 46 years.

Vera graduated from Western Washington University in 1971 and was a substitute teacher in Anacortes and LaConner for 10 years. She was involved with the Red Cross and served as a Girl Scout leader for 10 years. Vera enjoyed sewing, crafts, art, spinning, knitting and weaving as well as camping with her husband.

Vera was a past president and lifetime member of Skagit Valley Genealogical Society. In 1991 she published a family history book about her ancestors, the Rogers family who first arrived in the US with the Pilgrims on the Mayflower, with many of that family settling in Skagit County. Her interest in family history expanded to an interest in local history as well, and she was a driving force behind the project to get all of the local cemetery records in print.

She worked tirelessly over the past year with the supervision and arrangement of the society collection in the move to the newly constructed Burlington Public Library by organizing the files for ease in researching in the library. She has developed a schedule for volunteers serving at the library. Joan has been an active member and participant at SVGS Board meetings.

Once she discovered her Canadian relatives, a new treasure of family was opened to her, enabling exposure to huge family ties. For a person pursuing her roots, this was immense.

She followed a number of interests: Sweet Adeline's, Harmonaires, Civil Air Patrol, Artists interest, travel and Tai Chi.

Library Report for SVGS Newsletter Jan. 2010

Your SVGS Library recently acquired an excellent new addition to its collection. "Alpine on the Lake: A History of the People of Lake Cavanaugh and Alpine Village," researched and compiled by Allan Ray Wenzel, attracted me immediately to pick up and peruse. Turning past its attractively designed hard cover, the reader finds 124 pages filled with the early Lake Cavanaugh and Alpine Village history. Highlights of the book include black and white photographs of gravestones, the lake area, homes, logging operations, carefully selected illustrations of early census records, annual reports (1896), and maps. In addition, brief biographical sketches of notable pioneers complete with the author's commentary on researching that particular individual and when known, where the person moved to in later years.

Allan Ray Wenzel, is a professional historian who enjoys spending his summers at Lake Cavanaugh. His long list of memberships in a host of historical societies, such as Sons of the American Revolution, Order of the First Families of Maryland, Order of the Founders and Patriots of America, etc., clearly reflects his passion for American History.

Mr. Wenzel paid attention to ensuring the reader's pleasure by including tales of the times from the early Cavanaugh school students to the old Alpine Village Post Office. Contributing to the folk lore and history for this book, Mr. Wenzel collaborated with Ray Jordan, who spent his later years collecting stories from "old timers" of Skagit County and writing them for future generations to enjoy.

If your family has links to the Lake Cavanaugh/Alpine Village area or if you are keen on Skagit County's early history this treasure of a book is a must read for you. I will bring the book to the January SVGS meeting and pass it around so members can take a sneak preview peek at it. You'll surely want to schedule in some time to read it at the SVGS Library at the Burlington Public Library. A pleasurable reading journey awaits you.

***PBS lines up family history series
"Faces of America"***

When "Faces of America with Henry Louis Gates Jr." premieres on PBS in February, viewers also will get to see former champion figure skater Kristi Yamaguchi shed tears when she learns about the grandfather she never really knew. Meanwhile, novelist Louise Erdrich is shown cheering out loud when she is told one of her ancestors was one of the founders of Detroit.

"What this special proves is that white people, Latino people and Asian people are just as ignorant about their ancestors as black people," Gates told reporters at a Television Critics Association lunch. "The difference was, this time we were able to go back further," Gates said.

Olympic gold medalist Yamaguchi said she is happy Gates approached her about doing the special. "As so many things were revealed, I learned so much about my family," said Yamaguchi, who ended up meeting a whole set of cousins in Japan she didn't know existed. "It was a huge honor. It was truly a gift." "Faces of America with Henry Louis Gates Jr." is just one of the big-ticket series PBS programmers have in store. January 14, 2010

Notes from the genealogist desk:

Did you know you can get a copy of the actual death certificate of people who died in Washington State from the Everett Family History Center. If your relatives died between 1900 and 1955 it is well worth the trip. There are some very nice people there to help you.

You don't need to Soundex your names as everything is on the computer.

In doing research for others I have used this resource frequently and paid 10¢ for each record that I printed out.

Take the Everett-Mall exit. Stay to the right which will take you back over the freeway going south. The Family History Center is on the Left. Enter the driveway and go around to right side. The door is marked. Family Library is right there.

Who knows, perhaps your certificate is just waiting to be copied

A Simple Process

We gather genealogical and historical records from around the world and convert them into digital images which are stored in our online system.

You download the images to your computer and transcribe the highlighted information used to create a searchable online index.

The Religious Society of Friends (Quakers): the Limerick Papers

Detailed records of an Irish religious group dating back to the 18th century have been made available for public viewing on the Internet. The Religious Society of Friends, better known as the Quakers, was founded in 1652 and records of Limerick and Clare members and their activities can now be accessed on Limerick City Council's website.

During the famine, the group helped to set up soup kitchens across the country and organised the distribution of seeds for other food crops. About €14m -- in today's money -- was raised for the country mainly from Quakers living abroad during the famine.

Limerick city archivist, Jacqui Hayes said Quakers were well known for their charity work and innovation.

Among the records online are the Quakers' relief committee minutes books, which record their decisions in relation to relief in Clare and Limerick during the famine.
