

## 9 Tips for Writing Your Family History

- 1. Know what you want to write about: make an outline
- 2. Don't begin at the beginning: just start writing a story that you remember . You do not have to start at the beginning
- 3. Use prompts:stuck read a book of someone elses history or go to a tech tool or book for help
- 4. Remember: You're not carving in stone
- 5. Write naturally:pretend you're telling a friend your story, unless you want it like a published book
- 6. Organize your thought with apps
- 7. Seek inspiration: read other family history writings
- 8. Don't delay
- Get help: Seek out advice either family or tech tools


## RENEW YOUR MEMBERSHIP

# <u>Using WorldCat to Find Genealogy Books</u> <u>Dick Eastman</u> · <u>November 29, 2014</u> · <u>Books</u> · <u>4</u> Comments



\_\_\_\_\_\_WorldCat is the world's largest network of library content and services. It is an online library catalog that lets you look up items in libraries around the world. The items available include books, electronic documents, journals, microform, and audio and video recordings.

Best of all, WorldCat is available to everyone free of charge. WorldCat libraries provide access to their catalogs on the Web, where most people start their search for information. By using the WorldCat.org catalog, you can search the collections of libraries in your community and thousands more around the world.

Please keep in mind that these are catalogs of available books, not the text of the books. WorldCat is useful in at least three situations:

- 1. You know which item you want, but you don't know which libraries have it
- 2. You want to know what items exist on a particular subject (or by a particular author)
- 3. You need more information about an item (for instance, to get information for a proper citation in your bibliography)

- An Unofficial guide to Ancestry.com
- Delve into the card catalog. Far, far into it. Explore the categories and subcategories of databases, and type ancestral towns and counties into the Keyword search box. You'll find such obscure collections such as "California Narratives: The Adventures of a Forty-Niner," "General Business Review of Highland County, Ohio" and "Burlington Court Book" (court records and historical information on Quaker, Swedish, English and Dutch settlers in West New Jersey from 1680 to about 1709).
