# "Skagit Memories"

Series # 6 complied by the Skagit County Historical Society will be excerpt in future newsletters.

The editor was Charles Dwelley and Assistant editor, Helen Dwelley, published in 1979.

These are stories of the settlement years as written by the pioneers themselves.

#### **PREFACE**

It was Captain George Vancouver, in 1792, who organized the charting expedition that revealed to the world a new territory for settlement by those restless individuals who are the pioneers of civilization. Captain Vancouver called the territory "New Georgia" and he wrote: "The serenity of the climate, pleasing landscapes and abundant fertility, require only to be enriched by the industry of man, to render it the most lovely country that can be imagined.

And so they came, by sea, later overland by covered wagon. The hazards of pioneer life and how they survived the early years is told by those who experienced those hard times. Their diaries, ledgers and letters, reveal their land, their home and their own way.

The Skagit River, named by the Indians, flows from the high Cascades the full length of the county to the shores of Puget Sound. It was the lifeline of communication and the river was a highway. Steamboats plied the waters as far up as the site of Newhalem, where gold was found. The pioneers tell their stories from before this land became Washington Territory.

1885—A Year of Fires—There probably has never been a summer in which destructive forest fires have not raged and 1885 was certainly no exception to the rule when fires swept through Guernes and Fidalgo Islands. The country was ravaged by the destructive fires that destroyed trees two or three hundred feet in height. It destroyed wood, rails, fences and buildings and the entire county was wrapped in a pall of smoke until September 26<sup>th</sup> when drenching rains put out the fires.

# HISTORY EXCERPTS: Mount Vernon Herald, 6 December 1917:

Richard, the three year old son of Mr. & Mrs. Fitzpatrick of McMurry, died last Sunday and was buried Monday afternoon. The little fellow had been ill for some time and passed away while the father was away from home, being confined in the hospital. The family has been in poor circumstances and friends appealed to the Rev. AW Wilson for charitable aid in effecting a suitable burial for the child. The undertaker, Grotheim, came to the rescue and furnished the casket, declining compensation.

Mrs. Esther Asp, wife of Carl F.O. Asp, died Tuesday morning, 4 December, after a long illness. Mrs. Asp came to Skagit County in 1894 from Ballard, WA. with her parents, Mr. & Mrs. L. E. Nelson, who reside at Deitrich, Idaho. She is survived by a husband and two children, Reynold, age 13, and Marguerite, age 12. Three sisters, Mrs. Oscar Polson of Mount Person, Mrs. Glen Gott of Falls City, and Florence Nelson of Dietrich. She was thirty-two years, three months of age. Saturday. in the Swedish Baptist church, Rev. A. F. Lysell, officiating. Interment will be at the I.O.O.F. Cemetery.

# AMOS BOWMAN, CITY FOUNDER, MAN OF AMBITION, FORESIGHT By Wallie Funk

A dream and a love that transcended mere hope for personal reward and an indomitable spirit are the cornerstones of Amos Bowman's Anacortes. After his arrival on Fidalgo Island in 1876 and until his death in 1894 Bowman held to his faith that Anacortes would someday, if not in his lifetime, rise to take its place among the foremost cities of the West. No soldier of fortune, Bowman was a man eminently qualified to carve from an island wilderness a city that would weather the whiplashes of boom and depression.

Then began years of strenuous planning, appeals to officials of the nation's greatest railroads, and the systematic and widespread publicizing of Anacortes as the prospective "New York of the West." The "firsts" to Amos Bowman's credit in establishing the new city are a tribute to his tireless initiative.

Bowman sought and succeeded in the establishment of the first United States mail service here, then the first post office. His was the first general store, the first civil and mining engineering company. He owned and operated the first pile driving service, scow building company, real estate and loan firm, and the first notary public, all accomplished by 1882. He then founded the "Northwest Enterprise Newspaper."

#### **EXTRACTS FROM THE NORTHWEST ENTERPRISE Continued**

Saturday 31 Oct. 1885:

Died at Whatcom, Monday 26 Oct. Mrs. Carrie Baber, wife of James M. Baber. She was the youngest daughter of the late Rev. B.B.Bowman of Kent County, Mich. And Mary Bowman, now of Deception Pass, Fidalgo Island. Born at Blair, Waterloo County, Ontario 3 August 1849, she attended Otterbein University, near Columbus, Ohio after her parents moved there in 1856. She then graduated from Hillsdale College, Mich. in 1873. After she taught school one year at Grandville, Mich. she married James M. Baber and moved to Sterling, Illinois then Dunlap, Iowa. In 1883 they moved to Riverside, CA, raising oranges and raisins.

She suffered a typhoid fever attack which developed into consumption. She came to Puget Sound to be near her mother, sisters and two brothers, Amos and A. C. Bowman. Her decline was rapid. Burial was in Joseph Wolfe's private lot at Whatcom, overlooking Bellingham Bay.

Saturday, 14 Nov. 1885: Born 6 Nov, to the wife of Noah Nelson of Anacortes, a boy

Saturday 21 Nov. 1885: Married at Whatcom, 18 Nov. John Berg of Nooksack to Miss Eden Nelson of Fidalgo. Saturday 5 December 1885: Robert Feltwell died when his boat capsized between Hat Island and the Samish shore. He hung on until help reached him, but died of the cold before reaching land. He was an industrious young man who had come to this county from Kansas and settled on a ranch on the Samish.

Saturday 12 Dec. 1885: Born 7 Dec. to the wife of J. Hodder of Fidalgo Island, a son.

Saturday 9 Jan 1886: Born 23 Dec. to the wife of E.J.Stewart of Sumner, Pierce County, a daughter .-----FINI

# MY FAVORITE ANCESTOR By Member John Royston Fisher

Daniel Boone, my fourth great-grandfather, was born 2 November 1734 in Berks County, PA. He had very little formal education but did learn to read and write. His English Quaker family moved to North Carolina while Daniel was still a youth. While he was not the first into Kentucky, he and companions did go into that area to hunt and trap in the late 1760's. An attempt in 1773 to go into Kentucky to settle was turned back by an Indian attack which resulted in the death of one of Daniel's sons. In 1775 a further attempt resulted in the future development of the Wilderness Trail through the Cumberland Gap and the first settlements in Kentucky....one of which was Boonesborough. In the move to this area Daniel's wife, Rebecca Bryan Boone and their daughter, became the first white women in Kentucky.

Although Daniel Boone settled on, or purchased a number of pieces of land, he did not prosper because he did not always follow up on the registration of the land – or he was bilked out of the land by dishonest or political situations. In 1799 he left Kentucky, moving his family to Missouri, following his son Daniel Morgan Boone, and lived there in the St Charles area until his death 26 September 1820. In 1845 a delegation from Kentucky traveled to Missouri to retrieve the bodies of Daniel and Rebecca Boone and re-inter them in Frankfort, Kentucky.

A few years ago, in the company of a Boone Historian in the St Louis area of Missouri, we visited most of the Boone locations in Missouri. In May of this year we plan to visit many of those locations in Kentucky. Incidentally, Daniel did not wear a coonskin cap, though he is often so portrayed. His favorite topper was a fedora. The coonskin caps were worn by frontiersmen Kit Carson and Davy Crockett!

# **BOOKS TO SHARE**

Our Librarian, Joan Udd, is willing to share her books with other members. She has Doukhobors as part of her ancestry. Some of her books are "The Dukhobors: Their history in Russia, Their migration to Canada," by Joseph Elkinton, 1903, a facimilie reprint with 336 pages and index.

## THE STATUE OF LIBERTY-ELLIS ISLAND

# INTERNET TIPS:

Never use punctuation marks after initials in a name.

Example: J. M. Smith. It will cause the search engine to show zero hits.

Use quotes such as "John Smith" and the search engine will look for that exact phrase.

Do not use abbreviations! The search engine does not know that regt and regiment are the same, so your search will be ineffective.

**Do not use any capital letters.** Enter names in the lower case, then the search engine will look for any variations of upper and lower case or mixed case.

Make sure there are spaces between each search word, and try different search engines.

Be consistent. Try all your names before moving to a different search engine.

Keep a log: for whom, when and results. Go back often to recheck for new data.
