
It is appropriate that we all seem to feel a calling in one area of passion or another as "The Chosen" suggests. Finding the help from source material and people only demand knowing where to go.

NOTICE

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO SVGS BYLAWS

"Make all financial records of the fiscal year available for audit no later than 15 (fifteen) days following the close of the fiscal year. The Audit Committee shall make its written report to the Board of Directors no later than 45 (forty-five) days following the receipt of the financial records."

By-laws change to Article III Section E (Membership); currently states:

The fiscal year shall run from June 1 to May 31.

The proposal will change the Fiscal Year to January 1 through December 31.

This will change Article IV Section C Number 1 (Meetings) to; The regular meeting in October shall be known as the Annual Meeting:

The above will also change Article V Section D Number 3: All officers shall take office at the January Board Meeting.

Article III Section C, Number 1- (Dues)

Proposed change in membership dues, increasing individual dues to \$12.00 from \$10.00, family Membership to \$15.00 from \$12.00 and associate membership to \$12.00 from \$10.00 effective in January 2007.

Irish-American Heritage Month, 2006

The following is a Proclamation by the President of the United States of America:

The histories of Ireland and the United States are deeply intertwined. For generations, the sons and daughters of Ireland have come to America with a spirit of determination and optimism that has strengthened our Nation's character and enriched our history. During Irish-American Heritage Month, we celebrate Irish Americans and the significant contributions they have made to our Nation.

During the Great Potato Famine of the 19th century, approximately 1 million Irish came to America. And over the last 150 years, millions more have come from Ireland to the United

States. In this country, Irish Americans have ably served in their communities, in the government, and in the Armed Forces. They have achieved great success in all walks of life. Actress Grace Kelly entertained us and influenced our culture; industrialist Henry Ford transformed factory production and transportation; and President Ronald Reagan dedicated himself to the spread of peace, liberty, and democracy, helping to change our country and the world.

This month, we recognize the proud history and many accomplishments of Irish Americans. Our Nation is grateful for the role they have played in defending and renewing the ideals that we cherish. Their hard work, firm values, and strong faith have made our Nation a better place.

NOW, THEREFORE I, GEORGE W. BUSH, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim March 2006 as **Irish-American Heritage Month**. I call upon all Americans to observe this month by celebrating the contributions of Irish Americans to our Nation.

Bureau of Land Management Database Back

The Bureau of Land Management (a part of the US Department of the Interior) has once again made their database of land patent records available on their website. The site was shut down last April due to a lawsuit involving the security of information about the Indian Trust Fund.

The Washington State Genealogist

The first issue of WSGS's research journal, *The Washington State Genealogist*, is scheduled for publication about March 31st. The issue will include stories of families who migrated to Washington, individuals who impacted the expanding railroad system, and extracts from newspapers, church records and oyster claims. If the first issue is well received, and researchers are willing to share interesting or unusual records and stories, the WSGS Board may continue the journal on a semiannual or quarterly basis.

WSGS Historian Position

A volunteer is needed to fill the Historian position on the WSGS Board. The Board is considering expanding the Historian's duties to go beyond attending Board meetings and the traditional "keeper of the scrapbooks" activities, to include (1) "Take or arrange for photographs of newly appointed or elected Board members, Board and Annual meetings, and WSGS conferences" which would help with Newsletter articles, Outstanding Volunteer Awards, as well as the scrapbook/historical files; and (2) "Annually write a comprehensive historical report of WSGS activities and make copies available for distribution at the WSGS Conference and Annual Meeting." [It seems strange that a genealogical society whose members depend

upon written historical documentation does not produce a comprehensive document as a source for future research.

Family History Center Microfilm Rental Fees Increase

The following is an excerpt from an announcement to all Family History Center Directors from the Family History Support department of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints: The microfilm circulation loan fees will be changed effective 15 January 2006.

Loan fees for microfilm will change from \$3.25 to \$5.50. Microfiche fees will remain at 15ϕ per fiche.

All renewals, including films ordered at the \$3.25 fee, will be renewed at the new rate of \$5.50.

This fee change, the first since February 1997, is needed to keep pace with increasing costs. Continue to use the current Microfilm and Microfiche Order Card (35068) and Microfilm and Microfiche Order Sheet (31895)

Please note that the new fees still include return postage.

As most of you folks know, I bought back Heritage Quest Magazine, and much of the Heritage Quest retail operations from ProQuest three years ago. It was offered to me by ProQuest as a "silver lining" to the fact that Patty and I were both being laid off, after 10 years with AGLL, Sierra, and ProQuest. Although I knew that the operation was losing a lot of money, I thought that I could turn it around and make it profitable. I didn't want to see Heritage Quest Magazine go away. Having founded the magazine 17 years previously, my life was wrapped up in its publication. So I set off on the journey that ultimately cost us everything we owned.

On a slightly brighter note, I'm quite sure that Heritage Quest Magazine and Genealogy Bulletin will find a new home, and the subscribers will get what they paid for. The subscriberbase of these two publications is substantial. This will have to be done with the blessing of the courts and ProQuest, who according to contract, gets all this back if I default. How long that may take I have no idea.

I will continue to blog, although my personal blogs may be a little thin for a few weeks.. My commercial websites will be coming down shortly. Maybe I'll go back to research – which I love. I also plan to continue to operate a "Christmas Tour" to Salt Lake City – as I have for over 20 years.

Please don't think too poorly of me, although I don't blame you if you do. I feel I gave it my best – and that wasn't good enough.

to figure out what the life and times were like during the years of their living family member in Skagit County Washington. I'm especially proud of my ancestry in Skagit County Washington to the early years when we were still part of Whatcom County and not yet reached statehood here in Washington Territory. My direct line of Boyd's came here to live in Birdsview in 1882. Their in-laws the Savage family had been in the valley close to a decade already.

It was the Savage family letters of encouragement—one lonely sister to another—that brought the Boyd family out here from the open plains of the mid-west in the state of Nebraska to the green, lush area of the Skagit where the old growth trees still towered all over valley giving one a feeling of claustrophobia—as my great-great grandmother Olive Boyd related it.

While the Boyd and Savage family can be found in the classic "Skagit Memories" from the Skagit County Historical Society's Series of historical books started in the early 1970's. These two families are just a few of the hundreds then thousands of people starting a new life for themselves here in our beautiful valley or as L.A. Boyd and many others called it, "Gods Country". There are still untold stories from these early families to the most recent times to share. I know for fact the Skagit Valley Genealogical Society are not the only group and individuals looking to create helpful works.

The wealth of informative, helpful museums, historical associations, our own genealogical society, books and source material for "The Chosen" is so great and continues to build on those started by the Historical Society and elsewhere. It is just a great time to be a Skagit County descendant. Let me share some sources to explain why and state that this is not an ultimate list by any means.

The official county museum, **Skagit County Historical Museum** can be found in LaConner and houses not only early county artifacts contributed by early families but includes an archives that can be used by appointment. The user friendly **Anacortes Museum** in Anacortes currently has a display on the various ethnic groups that have immigrated to Skagit County from early history to present. **Sedro Woolley Museum** in Sedro Woolley houses displays and archives history of the surrounding Sedro Woolley area including north and east communities.

Historical Associations include Clear Lake Historical Assoc. passionately headed by Deanna Ammons, as well as the recently founded Big Lake Historical Association. Even the National Park Service North Cascade Complex in Marblemount archiving the geological history of Skagit County is headed by Jesse G. Kennedy Ph.D., a man who is always excited to help anyone with questions.

Besides the great wealth of material from the **Skagit County Historical Society Series**, several of which were reprinted last year in paperback and easily more assessable, other sources for historical record which were also used as source material for

the above mentioned Historical Series, include the early classics such as "Sebring's Skagit County Illustrated" published originally December 1902 then reprinted in 1983 by Washington State Genealogical & Historical Review. The reprint will probably be the only copy you would find and has a great many photos and histories of the early towns of Skagit along with some selected biographies. The majority of reprinted pictures though are found to be dark and murky, but if you can get a look at an original copy they are very breathtaking and in larger format.

The next historical book of significant value of course is our often mentioned (in this publication so I won't repeat myself) "An Illustrated History of Skagit & Snohomish Counties", published by Interstate Publishing Company in 1906, republished by the Skagit Valley Genealogical Society with full index, which was not include in the original. Any early history of Skagit Native American works of real importance are by Chief Martin Sampson titled "Indians of Skagit County" plus the work of June McCormick Collins "Valley of the Sprits The Upper Skagit Indians of Western Washington".

Books with individual and family biographies as well as fun stories from around the county include: "Ray's Writin's, Yarns of the Skagit Country" by Ray Jordan a collection of his newspaper columns as well as "My Best Loved Stories" by Mollie Dowdle; "Memories of Clear Lake" by Charles R. Hyatt published by Clear Lake Historical Assoc.—hard to find "Skagit Schoolma'am A Pioneer Teacher in the San Juans" by Elizabeth Duncan. "So They Called The Town Concrete" by late Concrete Herald publisher Charles Dwelley, first printed in 1980, reprinted by the Concrete Heritage Museum Assoc. two years ago. The Museum has been lovingly restored by board members and volunteers and has a great wealth of information for up-river families.

Many other authors contributed the same kinds of histories and stories in all the local county newspapers, including my own Boyd and Savage family Mabel Royal-Steen, C. Holmes and Katy Savage Pulsipher, respectively. Catherine McIntyre McClintock, Fred Slipper, Nan Hough, Wally Funk of Anacortes newspaper fame, to name a few. The other important works coming from Charles Dwelley longtime publisher of the **Concrete Herald**, Historian Dick Fallis who owned and operated the **Puget Sound Mail** in LaConner during the 1970's. A great period of growth in Skagit County.

"Hamilton 100 Years" by Carol Bates published in 1991 from the Hamilton Pioneer Museum to commemorate the 100 history of the town of Hamilton. "Amid Fields of Alyssum: A Year At Northern State" compiled by Dick Fallis and published by his Skagit—Advocate Publishing. Extremely important history on logging and sawmills is a work titled "Logging Railroads in Skagit County" by Dennis Blake Thompson of Sedro Woolley. A great book recording WWI veterans of Skagit & Whatcom Counties is "With The Colors" compiled and published by Louis Jacobin in 1921. Works by JoAnne Roe concerning the history of the North Cascade Highway "The North Cascadians" as well as Paul C. Pitzers "Building the Skagit" tells how the Dams came about.

Recent works from the Skagit Valley Herald, "The Skagit Collection Vols. I & II" share beautiful photos with captions on glossy paper. "Stories of the Skagit Anthology I & II" from the Skagit Valley Writers League. "Scandinavians of the Skagit Area" publish a great list and biographies of Scandinavian families from the Solidaritet Lodge #396 Mount Vernon.

Lest we forget the **Family History Center** in Mount Vernon and the LDS Church's great wealth of Microfilm and help in tracking down ancestry is indispensable.

The use of modern day technology gives us access on the internet to find or contribute to our family stories and histories in Skagit County. Starting with SVGS own website which includes an Obituary Name Index File as well as sources from their many publications that are listed and for sell, including County Census and Funeral Home Records. Hundreds of people are contributing to websites such as Noel V. Bourasaw's "Skagit River Journal" which includes updated histories of towns, events and pioneer families in Skagit County. "Skagit River History" produced by Larry Kunzler and his sons have transcribed massive amounts of works from early Skagit County Newspapers, indexed and easily searched at both websites. My own modest "The Stump Ranch" (on hiatus) is working toward capturing life in the small communities centered around Birdsview.



Northwest Studies in Bellingham holds a huge amount of source material on early Skagit County. Including the early **Oral Histories** on microfilm produced by the Skagit County Historical Society in the 1970's from pioneer descendants.

These websites can easily be found using a **Search Engine** such as **GOOGLE**. The books mentioned above—a great deal and more—can be searched for and found at a website called **ADDALL.COM** in their used and out of print search section. Just type in the search term "**SKAGIT**" and it will turn up everything available from all bookstores across America and other countries if you like. This can also be done at the auction website **E-BAY**. Also some titles can be found at **Easton Books** in Mount Vernon, a long time family owned used book store.

Not to forget **Skagit County's Pioneer Association**. This association being the first and earliest, has been recording a **Memorialist** (List) yearly of pioneer and early Skagit County families and descendants who have passed away during the previous year at the **Annual Pioneer Picnic** in August—last year marked the 101st Picnic. Early county historian John Conrad and his successor Dick Fallis have aggressively and faithfully kept record of these passing's.

The Skagit Valley Genealogical Society with its newly elected Heritage Historian Thomas Robinson and myself hope to continue in the same vain with the help of the SVGS indexing of obituaries, faithfully kept and filed by Barbara Ricketts and Norma Keefe-Hills. A yearly publication will be a supplement to the Special History Book Project. The first magazine size publication should be out late summer and titled "Skagit County Washington and Its People! 2005". *Title tentative*.

It has been my pleasure to be a part of Skagit Valley Genealogical Society's Special History Book Project title, "Skagit County Washington and Its People! 150 Years of Rich History & Heritage" We've had so many submissions from folks submitting their ancestry and relations from a 100 years past and earlier to recent times. I know the book committee is looking forward publish these family biographies to add to the above mentioned sources available to you—"The Chosen". Even with what has been contributed to our Society it doesn't seem to come close to capturing all the men, women and children who contributed to the growth and well being of Skagit County. I guarantee there are more years of working together as a community of historians, genealogists, societies, museums and enthusiasts to get close to sharing it all.
