WIGS & SVGS TO SGS

A report from Iona Raney, Secretary

In March I went with the Whidbey Island Genealogical Society (WIGS) to the Fiske Foundation Library and found that research facility better than I had expected. Although it is in the basement with strange steep stairs (a minus for old folks), the collection is good, arranged so it's easy to use and has something in all areas. New England, Northwest and Pennsylvania and New York are especially strong. The room is light and open, working conditions are good and they permit you to have lunch in the library, although there are also sandwich places nearby. Also the daily research fee is only \$ 5.00, which is nominal. Hours are strange, so that would have to be checked ahead of time.

This May the WIGS group invites the members of Skagit Valley Genealogical Society to share a research trip to the Seattle Genealogical Society (SGS) research library on Wednesday, June 6. The bus leaves the parking lot between Denny's and the old Ernst store, off College Way, Mount Vernon, between 8:00 a.m. and 8:15 a.m. on that day, and returns about 4 p.m. The cost for transportation is \$15, and we usually collect up to \$1 per passenger as a tip for the driver. There is a fee of \$5, to research in the SGS unless you happen to be a member already. This is a fine opportunity to go to a good research facility, use their collection and not have to drive into town. One other option exists....... For those of you who do not know, the SGS moved the first of May to 6200 Sand Point Way, NE in Seattle, into the former home of a pizza parlor, directly across the street from the Archives. You could ride the bus, go to the archives and return with us on the bus. What opportunities!!!! The Archives has a pretty complete set of City Directories that will aid in the 1930 Census when it is issued, in 2002. Directories give us the ability to search an alphabetical list of people living in a given community. We can locate individuals in a city that is not indexed in the census. Knowing the address of the families you are searching will lead you directly to that person. Checking the organizations and churches in that neighborhood might lead you to finding where your ancestor was a member. The listings of streets can help you determine which Enumeration District the family lived when the census was made. Some cities list the births, deaths and marriages for the prior year, and the ads can give you a clue if your ancestor owned a business. So next time you get your hands on one of these jewels, explore to see what else you can learn about the town your ancestor lived. From Family Tree Finders. April 24, 2001, by Rhonda McClure.

ELLIS ISLAND

The new Ellis Island Web site was swamped by traffic, bringing it near collapse on the first day of operation. It was so overwhelmed that 85 % of visitors were being turned away. Records of 22 million immigrants, passengers and crewmembers who entered the port of New York between 1892 and 1924 is what they were after. After 8 hours the site had logged 8 million visitors. With 100 million living descendants, about 40 % of the U. S. population, it's no wonder the site was deluged. The Statue of Liberty Foundation spent five years and put in \$ 22.5 million building the database. The group expects to recoup some of the costs when it starts selling reproductions of actual manifest pages and other historical info on the Net in about six weeks.

If you know the date and ship your ancestors arrived on when they came to America, and you are interested in obtaining a copy of their papers, write to "IMMIGRATION & NATURALIZATION" 425 Eye Street, NW. Washington D.C. 20536 and ask for a copy of the "Intent" or the application. They cannot copy the certificate itself so specify that you do NOT need certification and it is for family history purposes.

SEATTLE PUBLIC CENTRAL LIBRARY The Seattle Public Library's Central Branch at 1000 4th Avenue, Seattle, will be closed in June to make way for the new building to be erected on the same site. On Friday, 08 June, at 6 p.m., the library will close. On Saturday, 7 July, at 9 a.m., the library will reopen at 800 Pike Street, with the same hours and staff. It is also on microfilm in the collection at the Heritage Quest Research Library 909 Main Street, #5 Sumner, WA. It is also available from your society genealogist.
