Liberty Bell Has Been Moved

The Liberty Bell has been moved to a new home 1,000 feet to the new Liberty Bell Center 9 October 2003. The 2,080-pound bell was delivered to Philadelphia in 1752 and hung in the Pennsylvania State House, later Independence Hall, and starting in 1753 was there before being moved to the Liberty Bell Pavilion in 1976.

The cost of the new Liberty Bell Center cost \$12.6 million with primary funding coming from the City of Philadelphia and other sources.



Publications:

Publication committee has been very active over the past few months. Mount Vernon Cemetery, Bay View Cemetery and Bow Cemetery have all been completed and are now ready for purchase. See attached flyer insert.

The Fir-Conway Lutheran Cemetery and the Guemes Island cemeteries are both in the proof reading stages and should be available around the first of the year. At a recent meeting it was determined, at the request of local mortuaries, that the Funeral Home Index book needs to be updated. John Fisher of the Projects committee will be checking with local mortuaries to make arrangements for obtaining copies of funeral records since 1994.

Obituary Database:

More than 18,535 obits from 19 different area newspapers are in this database. Earlier obituaries are less consistently entered, dating from perhaps 1907. Hazel stated that obits are not accessible in local newspapers, but an index of obituaries in our files will be online. The obituaries and news articles will be available at a small fee if requested. The group is also collecting obits from the year 2000 to present for later processing.

Programs:

John Hayes on programs reported no change. He reported on the survey conducted at the last meeting. There were 20 surveys completed and turned in. The most requested program was using Internet for genealogical purposes, indicated by 12 of the 20 respondents. Eighteen of the respondents had a computer. This was a more than 50% response from those present

Projects:

John Fisher, projects, reported no change in projects. Although our earlier reports indicated John Fisher would read the cemetery at Northern State hospital, conditions have changed. Terms of the privacy of information act forbid the publication of names of those persons in that cemetery. John will remove from the Skagit County Cemetery book in the library collection, the list of names of persons in this cemetery. There was also mention of some 200 people who were buried in one lot at Hawthorne Lawne Memorial Park Cemetery without their identities. The officials at Hawthorne have been appropriately advised of information we received from Washington State. John suggested that inquiries about people who died at Northern State, be forwarded to the Olympia office of the Department of Social and Health Services, (DSHS) which interpreted the legal ramifications of the privacy act. The group concurred that John could handle this matter without formal action. If you have questions on this subject, contact John Fisher at 360-293-4986.

Researching In The Northwest Part of Washington State

There is available at the following location a data of Naturalization papers for 34, 000 persons in the 7 Northwest counties served by the Northwest Region. These records cover the time period 1890-1980.

A data base of Territorial Case Files- both civil and criminal- for the time period 1854-1874. Included in the information are names of all people mentioned in the papers so preserved. This includes not only the plaintiff and defendant but jury members and other persons involved in the case and the trial thereof. Along with, in some cases, personal letters of the individuals named.

Local News From Skagit county

Skagit County Fall Flood

According to the Skagit County Department of Emergency Management (DEM) 29 October, costs totaling more than \$11 million in damages for this Fall Season flooding of the Skagit River.

The majority of the damage occurred east of Sedro Woolley at the communities of Hamilton, Cape Horn, Rockport and Marblemount. With the river cresting in Concrete at 33.3 feet and 29.2 feet in Mt. Vernon. Gov. Gary Locke walked through the Mt. Vernon area 23 October to assess the damage for himself.

The community of Hamilton has always been one of the hardest hit areas in the county. If you happen to be driving east or west on Hiway 20 during one of our infamous floodspast the "Welcome to Hamilton" sign, you'll notice a lot of RV's, campers, cars parked by the Baptist Church.

The reason I mention the church is their consistency to be at hand for the community of Hamilton and should be commended for it.

I believe this will also help us with our current book project —posted elsewhere in the newsletter. Gladys Pape Miller

Gladys Ellis Pape Miller passed away in Mount Vernon, WA on Monday, July 14, 2003. She was born in Concrete, WA on April 23, 1908, the daughter of James L. Pape and Grace Boyd Pape- both early Skagit county families.

She was a lifetime member of the Presbyterian Church, baptized in the old log Mount Baker Presbyterian Church in Concrete.

She grew up and attended schools in the Hamilton area. In 1928 she married Charles Robert Reece in Sedro-Woolley, they had one child, a daughter, Charlene. For a few years they lived and were employed in Seattle. In 1936 they moved back to Skagit Valley and made their home at Van Horn. He was employed with the Superior Portland Cement Co. and she was a telephone operator for Skagit Telephone and Telegraph (owned locally by Stowe and Judy). Charles left the area, but Gladys was employed as a telephone operator for many years maintaining her home and raising her daughter in Concrete.

In 1948 Gladys married Magnus F. Miller- Magnus was the grandson of Magnus Miller, founder of the town of Baker; later to become the town of Concrete. He was recalled into the Navy for the Korean War. They spent two years in San

Francisco where Gladys worked at the jewelry counter on the Navy Base at Treasure Island. When they returned to Concrete she worked for a short time at the telephone office and began getting involved in civic affairs.

She helped organize the Rural Fire Dept., served as president of The Upper Skagit Garden Club and later as district director of Chuckanut Garden Clubs and on the Washington State Federation Garden Board.



She was active in and a lifetime member of the Skagit Historical Society at the time the museum was built in the La Conner Water Tank. She was a member of the Charles Carroll Chapter of DAR in Sedro -Woolley.

In 1968 the cement plant, (then Lone Star Cement) closed in Concrete and the Miller's moved to Seattle where Mr. Miller was general foreman at the Duwamish plant.

Gladys became active in the Mary Morris Chapter and was elected regent and a member of the Rainier Chapter, DAR. She and Magnus formed a block watch on Gatewood Hill in the 37th SW block. For nine years Gladys served as state historian of The Mayflower Society. She was a life member of the Mayflower Descendants, an eleventh generation descendant of Richard Warren. She attended Hillcrest Presbyterian Church in West Seattle.

She moved to Mount Vernon in 1999 to be close to family after Magnus passed away.

She is survived by her daughter, Charlene LaFleur-Bronson and a granddaughter Kathleen and her husband David..., all of Mount Vernon, numerous nieces and nephews, especially James H. Pape and close friends here, and her neighbors in the West Seattle neighborhood.

She was preceded in death by her parents, Grace (Boyd) Pape; Nov. 1950 and James Pape; Sept. 1954. Husband, Magnus F. Miller; sisters: Hazel O'Hara and Corrine Robinson; brothers: Carl, Ralph, James and Eugene Pape; also her first husband, Charles Reece.

We celebrated her 95th Birthday this year. By her request there will be no funeral services. She will be inurned in Forest Park Cemetery in Concrete in a private family ceremony.

Within the past year we've lost two Boyd family descendants-Norman Johnson and Lewis W. Boyd - now we've lost a third. Reaching 95 years of age is no small thing, especially staying healthy physically and mentally; but Gladys seemed to pull it off up until recently- as Norm Johnson did at 94. I only met these Boyd cousins within the last few years -sad to say- but I could see that Gladys was a woman of fierce independence and spoke her own mind, who enjoyed her own home until close to the end.

Gladys maybe patterned her life after her mentors-<u>Kate</u> <u>Glover & Nell Wheelock</u> early feminist in the Skagit Valley (no small feat up this way the first half of the 20th Century) whom Gladys shared remembrances at the Stump Ranch website.

Like Norm, Gladys attended the funeral of their grandfather Alex Boyd after he passed February of 1918. The picture 0n page 4 shows Gladys during the memorial Easter Sunday 1918 at the home of her Aunt and Uncle, Annie and Joe Hoyt in Prairie, Wa. Gladys is the girl to the far left, her mother Grace is the woman in the upper right corner. The L. A. Boyd family came to Skagit county October 1882, many descendants are still in the area. Including Ye Editor


