Jasper Gates Father of Mount Vernon



“He was the first settler to take a dangerous path through the mud and brush along the Skagit River and make a homestead in what is now downtown Mount Vernon...local historian Dick Fallis said it’s high time that Jasper Gates received the recognition he deserves.” Skagit Valley Herald

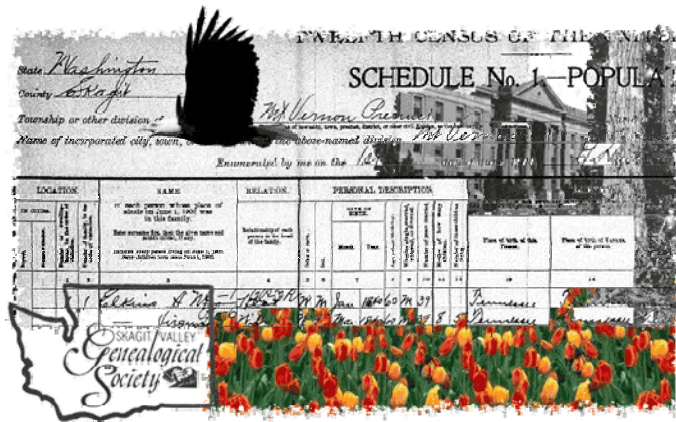
Formerly dedicated Saturday October 1st at the corner of First & Gates St. in Mount Vernon the Jasper Gates statue was unveiled to the public after the dedicated six year persistence of Dick Fallis to see the original father of the town of Mount Vernon honored.

According to the biography in the dedication brochure by Dick Fallis, Jasper Gates was born 9 April 1840 in Adair County, Missouri on the family farm. He married Clarinda Kimble in 1860 and by 1869 migrated west to the Skagit River area, then part of Whatcom County. He chose an area for his homestead close to the log jams in the river by the bends; this is the same site where the statue was dedicated. According to Dick, “the family greeted all persons coming into the area, provided hospitality and help in getting started in the new land. Jasper sold ten acres of his homestead land to Harrison Clothier and Ed English for purposes of getting the town and Post Office established...Jasper and Clarinda worked closely with the developing town, encouraging families to settle there and help establish needed services, schools, churches, medical facilities, hotels and restaurants, parks and public facilities.” Mount Vernon was established as the county seat in 1883. Clarinda brought sheep to the area for the wool, learned the local Native American languages to establish friendly relations with the local tribes. Jasper Gates died in 1923.

The sculptor artist commissioned to create and complete the granite statue was Tracy W. Powell of Anacortes. Tracy also created the “Maiden of Deception Pass” located at Deception Pass Park. The Mount Vernon Arts Commission and the non-profit Mount Vernon Parks Foundation, with some local students’, a grant and personal donations contributed toward raising the \$23,000.00 to see to its completion. The photo used to base the statue on was that of Jasper Gates with his grandson John Knox. *See photo on page 4*

This statue could not have seen the light of day without the persistence of Skagit County Pioneer Association Historian Dick Fallis - attending the dedication ceremony I noticed in the crowd a great deal of affection for Dick Fallis and Jasper Gates was not the only person honored that day. Dick was rightfully praised for his works, past and present; I knew the cheers and affection were genuine. Dick’s next goal is to have a statue created of Jasper Gates wife Clarinda with her sheep set next to her husband at First & Gates.

This month I want to be sure each of you has the opportunity to learn more about the wonderful things the **national archives** now has available online, so I'm going to give you some information and then hope that you spend time getting familiar with how to research on that site.

Once you are on the site: **www.archives.gov** be sure to scan the lefthand column, as you will find great hints for help, as well as a lot of information.

If you go to the right hand side of the page, under databases, you will see large letters printing ARC (Archives Research Center) and AAD (Access to Archive Databases) When you click on ARC you will find subjects such as African American; American History; Court Records; Genealogy; National Parks; Native American; patents/inventions; Science, Technology, National Resources, Environment; Women, and More Topics. After clicking on Genealogy I was presented with categories such as African American; Court Records; Federal Employees' Immigration and Emigration/Aliens, Chinese Immigration, Naturalization; Military Records - American Revolution, Civil War, Military Personnel Records, Spanish American War, WWI, WWII, Native American, including Guion Miller Roll Index and Index to Final Rolls (Dawes).

If I were to go to the AAD site I would find is has 400 data files with millions of records available online. They are grouped by series. When I went to the WW II series I found Enlistment records available. There are some tricks to printing, so be sure to read the instructions and use the printer-friendly version. I hope you will enjoy everything you find on this site - explore and spend some time there. Be sure to let me know of your results. Happy Ancestor Hunting.

The Board for Certification of Genealogists announced that, effective immediately, it has consolidated three research categories into one category that will be called Certified GenealogistSM. All those holding a current credential as Certified Genealogical Records SpecialistSM, Certified Lineage SpecialistSM, or Certified GenealogistSM will hold the designation of Certified GenealogistSM. The board also established application requirements for the single credential and voted to continue the existing renewal requirements for those already certified.

The Board reached the decisions after extensive talks at the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees in Salt Lake City on October 16. Incoming board president Connie Miller Lenzen, CGSM, of Portland, Oregon, explained that the change has been made for two reasons. "First, regardless of the type of work they do, all genealogists have the same skills. Second, having three research categories was confusing to both the genealogical community and the general public. The categories were different, but the differences were not well understood. We expect that the public can now more easily hire a certified person without being concerned about the differences. The one thing that will not change is the Board's commitment to excellence in genealogical work."

In May 2004, the Trustees approved the following motion, Lenzen continued: "Anyone demonstrating competence in all general skill areas of research, evidence analysis, kinship determination, and reporting should be eligible for certification as a

genealogist, without further distinction or limitation. Upon implementation, all certified persons in any research category would hold the designation Certified GenealogistSM." After more than a year of discussion, soliciting input, planning, and writing, the Board voted on the final draft of the revised application guide.

The new requirements have been designed to test the four skill areas used by all genealogists. The requirements are:

1. Acceptance of the Genealogist's Code.
2. Background resume
3. Document work with a BCG-supplied document: transcribe, abstract, and evaluate the document, prepare a research plan.
4. Document work with an applicant-supplied document: transcribe, abstract, and evaluate the document, prepare a research plan
5. Research report prepared for a client
6. Case study of conflicting or indirect evidence
7. Kinship determination project. The project is to include at least three couples in successive ancestral generations. The project may be in the form of a narrative genealogy, narrative lineage, or narrative pedigree.

Complete details for each requirement will be posted on the BCG website, www.bcgcertification.org, by December 1 of this year. Beginning January 1, 2006, only applications using the new requirements will be accepted. The new BCG Application Guide will be available at the National Genealogical Society conference in Chicago in June 2006.

The trustees also determined that individuals certified by BCG will still need to renew their certification every five years and that requirements for renewal will remain the same as they are now, regardless of the certification category previously held. Those requirements include an updated resume and the submission of up to four work samples. Current holders of the CGRSSM and CLSSM credentials will have until November 1, 2006 to make the transition to the CGSM credential. BCG's teaching categories, Certified Genealogical LecturerSM and Certified Genealogical InstructorSM, are not affected by the change to a single research credential.

Also unchanged is the two-step application process. Individuals file a preliminary application form and then have up to one year to submit their completed portfolio. Those who have already filed a preliminary application form will have the opportunity to decide whether to continue under the previous requirements or convert to the new requirements. Any preliminary applications filed on or after January 1, 2006 must follow the new requirements.

Since its founding in 1964, The Board for Certification of Genealogists has promulgated--in research, lectures, and publications--attainable, uniform standards of competence and ethics that have become generally accepted throughout the field. Its publication, The BCG Genealogical Standards Manual, sets forth the currently accepted standards for all areas of genealogical research.

Civil War Soldiers' Graves Online Database

The Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) was the largest fraternal organization for Union veterans. It was a very active organization in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Only Union veterans were permitted to join the GAR. As the members aged and then died, the organization eventually disappeared. However, it was replaced by the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, with membership restricted to descendants of Union Civil War veterans. The Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War inherited most of the records of the national GAR organization, as well as many of the records of local chapters (called "encampments").

Is it Protected Under Copyright Laws?

Genealogists often republish materials from old books as well as from archives, courthouses Web sites, and other sources. Sadly, many modern day genealogists simply ignore copyright laws. Doing so can result in an unpleasant notice from a law firm appearing in your mailbox. The laws that limit someone's right to copy a work have changed in recent years. Your awareness of the current laws can protect you from land mines of liability as you prepare your research for publication.

The question quickly arises: "How can I tell if a work falls under copyright protection or not?"

There are many articles available that discuss U.S. copyright laws, but many of them are written in a strange language called "legalese English" that leaves the reader with as many questions as he or she started with.

Attorney Lloyd J. Jassin has written "New Rules For Using Public Domain Materials," an article that even I could understand. It does not specifically address genealogy issues, but the rules discussed there apply to all works in the United States, whether genealogy-related or not. Best of all, Jassin writes in plain English. Here is one short excerpt:

"One helpful rule-of-thumb is that all works published in the United States before 1923 are in the public domain in the United States."

Another says:

"Prior to January 1978, the duration of all copyrights was split into two 28-year consecutive terms. Once the work was published with a valid copyright notice, the copyright lasted for an initial term of 28- years. However, the copyright owner was given the option to renew the copyright for an additional period of 28-years during the last year of the initial term."

A Great Time to Celebrate History and Heritage in Skagit County

Since the inception of Skagit Valley Genealogical Society's book project '*Skagit County Washington and Its People 150 Years of Rich History & Heritage*' in late 2003; the society has received up to 130 submissions from early Skagit Valley families which included their family biographies and stories.

The idea early on was to create a book that was a sequel of sorts to the classic history of Skagit County, "An Illustrated History of Skagit & Snohomish Counties, Washington." - hereafter called the 1906 History. Published by Interstate Publishing Company in 1906 to outline the early history of the counties with biographies of pioneers, it has become one of the most valuable

resources to local historians.

The Skagit Valley Genealogical Society in conjunction with the Stillaquamish Valley

Genealogical Society of Snohomish County re-published the 1906 History in hardbound and sold out fairly quickly. The society also produced an '*Every Name Index for the 1906 History*' in 2000 that had not been included in the original work, making it easier to find an ancestor; this index is still available for purchase.

Unfortunately, while the biographies of the early pioneers in the 1906 History are an important resource to family historians, they were paid submissions. Thus, not all pioneers and early settlers were represented, most just couldn't afford the price of being added to the book.

With this new volume we not only wanted to add those pioneer families and settlers who were absent from the 1906 History, we also have no interest in being paid for adding these biographies. Also, with close to 100 years since the 1906 History came out, there are far more people who have moved to Skagit County from all areas of the United States and other countries. All have contributed a great deal to the growth and economy of the county; not only as business elite or politicians, but also as farmers, loggers, fisherman, builders of homes, roads and dams, homemakers etc.

It is the Skagit Valley Genealogical Society's desire to have a fair representation of the cultures and ethnic backgrounds that make up the backbone and lively composition of Skagit County and its growth.

Our goal is to have as many historical and present family stories as we can gather. We would like to have your contributions slanted toward the life of the primary ancestor you have

chosen, i.e., a grandparent, great grandparent, parent, yourself and/or a sibling, with connections to Skagit County. Please identify the location in the county, if known. You may enter as many names with life stories as you choose, as there is no charge for submitting your information. The questionnaire is a guideline for the information we are seeking, however, you may submit a narrative if you choose. Narratives may be sent via email if desired. We reserve the right to edit all information for publication.

Photos of family groups, individuals, businesses, churches or schools may also be submitted. Group photos should have identification of those included in the photos as well as a written consent for publication of anyone that is still living.

We are accepting submissions for this new publication *through the end of December 2005*. A questionnaire is available on our website at www.rootsweb.com/~wasvgs or by email request at genealogy2@verizon.net. A request may also be sent to SVGS, P.O. Box 715, Conway, Washington 98238-0715 or by calling 360-424-6528 ext 4. We look forward to receiving



many more biographies and/or family memories for this publication. Our society would like to thank everyone for submitting your own or your

ancestors' information. We look forward to celebrating with you our mutual history and heritage in Skagit County.

Mr. Jassin also describes how to check to see if a pre-1978 copyright was renewed, noting that less than 15% of all copyrighted works of that period were ever renewed. Here is another quote:

If you are interested in older – permission free – works published between 1923 and 1963, you will need to investigate whether the work's copyright was renewed. In this case, you'll need to do a copyright search by contacting the Copyright Office, or a qualified copyright search firm or intellectual property attorney.

This article should be required reading for any genealogist who is thinking about publishing data on the Web or about publishing a book. It even applies to anyone who contributes data to one of the big online databases, such as RootsWeb, FamilySearch.org, Ancestry.com and others.
