My Favorite Ancestor.....GOV.....My Father by Shirlee Weyer Fisher

Born in Iowa 24 January 1892 and named in infancy: **Aaron Menrath Weyer,** the Aaron from his maternal grandfather, the Menrath from his paternal grandfather. When he was about four years old his mother's older brother, **Samuel Parsons**, said that was just too much name for a scrawny redhead. "We will nickname him Governor – and call him GOV. And so it was from age four to his death at age 84 – and beyond. We family members still speak of GOV and his personality, sense of humor and general goodness!

GOV was a strong advocate of education – probably because he was denied that. From my earliest days it was understood schooling was the first order of business. There was no break; college followed high school, just as high school followed the elementary and junior high years; and my brother Dick and I knew that. Dick finished high school in 1943 and went to do his share in WWII and did not return, as he met his death in Germany in November 1944 at age 19.

GOV was also very patriotic – proud of the ancestors who had served in the Revolutionary War; and in the Civil War – the above mentioned **Aaron Parsons and Menrath Weyer** both served in the infantry in the NJ Volunteers. Aaron received a wound at the battle of Williamsburg, VA in May 1862 and carried the lead pellet near his heart for the rest of his life – he died in 1910. My parents never recovered from the loss of their only son, but GOV was proud of Dick's service! GOV did his share in France in WWI.

GOV left me a lot of memories and good family times. He also left me three books that he had written in his retirement...(1) about his life and memories growing up and until WWI; (2) about his experiences in WWI; and (3) about his return from France, his marriage to my mother and up until a short time after I appeared on the scene. He did not go any further. I'm sure it was because he could not bring himself to write about Dick – and had he gone beyond my first two and one-half years he would have had to do that. He was the very most important influence in my life! And though he has been gone for nearly 25 years – I miss him every day!

1880 Census on CD-Rom: The Society has purchased this major research tool from the LDS Church. There are 56 CD's, the largest census to be automated. A viewer must be installed and 20 CD's contain the

National Index. The remainder is divided by regions of the United States, 38 states and 8 territories. Enter a name and a search is made of over 50,000 inhabitants. You will be instructed as to which CD will have your family. Insert the CD with the appropriate alphabetical listing. This program does not work with MacIntosh computers, or earlier versions before Windows 95, 4.0.

The membership is welcome to use it with a few guidelines set by the board. Diane Partington, Society Genealogist, will be the keeper and she will do requested look-ups, or a member may take the set home for a one-week period. "CODE OF ETHICS" for Genealogy

This code of ethics defines the standard used by the more experienced researcher. It also offers the important aspects of research for the novice or beginner. A key point relates to the validity of the material, which means little if based on assumptions, best guesses, and personally unverified data, including data from books or the Internet, or from someone else's unverified data. That verification usually requires seeing and transcribing or photocopying the original document and at a minimum requires stating the source of the copy, and from where it was obtained. The standards that should govern the behavior of researchers concern five distinct and essential areas.

- (1) Findings must be based on accepted research methods;
- (2) Interaction with other researchers and record custodial staff should be cordial and facilitative;
- (3) Intellectual honesty must be impeccable;
- (4) Claims regarding both self and service must be appropriately qualified;
- (5) Research materials must be treated with care and be made available to others when possible. Each of these categories is elaborated in outline form.

I. Basis of findings

- A. Base findings upon facts or valid inferences based in fact.
- B. Accept a "preponderance of evidence" where direct proof is not possible.
- C. Be prepared to explain your methodology.
- D. Set out fully any conflicting data and use discretion in its interpretation.
- E. Accept that conclusions are based upon a preponderance of evidence and logical extrapolations, and therefore, are never absolute.
- F. Insist upon and support, by citing sources and documentation, the "chain of evidence" required for a given project.
- G. Maintain reasonable accuracy in recording and reporting information by placing quality over quantity.

II. Interaction with other researchers and custodial record staff

- A. Act with integrity, courtesy, and cooperation with fellow researchers and record staff.
- B. Support other researchers in becoming more competent.
- C. Strive to broaden and deepen your research skills.

III. Intellectual honesty

- A. Guard against dishonest or unethical practices.
- B. Do not represent as your own, the work of another.
- C. Never knowingly misquote a document, nor cite as authoritative a questionable source.
- D. Use whatever ethical means is available to guard against and to expose dishonest or unethical practices in research.
- E. Avoid withholding or concealing any factual data that stands contrary to your personal desires.
- F. Give full credit to sources and materials belonging to another.
- G. Observe strictly the canons of copyright law.

IV. Claims regarding self or service

- A. Do not represent yourself as competent beyond your training or experience.
- B. Do not make exaggerated, misleading, or false claims about the benefits of genealogical or historic knowledge.

V. Availability and care of materials

- A. Be supportive in the collection, preservation, and availability of appropriate books and records.
- B. Support making all public records accessible.
- C. Treat with greatest care and respect all public and private records and books made available to you.
- D. Return all records, books, and materials to the proper or designated place in a timely manner.
- E. Take responsibility in the preservation and care of archival and library materials.

EXCERPTS from the SAN JUAN ISLANDER NEWSPAPER

Compiled by Donna Macy Sand, contributed and previously printed by Whatcom County Genealogical Society. *In the old days Skagit County was considered part of Whatcom.*

Jan 14, 1897 Mrs. W. Nichols of Fairhaven, formerly of San Juan died. M/M Nichols and daughter came here about 6 years ago and recently moved to Fairhaven so the daughter could attend school.

The infant daughter of M/M. L. C. Larson died at 6 weeks of age.

Jan 28, 1897 Charles Edward Cline has died. Born of German-Irish parentage at Danville, Illinois, July 8, 1853. In February 1872 he went to St. Louis, MO, then to Nebraska in 1876. In 1883 he came to the coast and settled in Lynden in 1884. He was married December 29, 1889 at Kent, to Rebecca Lanning, and has two sons.

April 29, 1897 Mr. Oscar W. Day died at home on Saturday afternoon. He was 48 years of age. He had two brothers: A. A. Day of Blaine, WA. and B. A. Day of Hastings, MN.

June 17, 1897 Annie Wilson of Fairhaven, died June 9, 1897, buried at Bayview Cemetery, Whatcom, an only child. Her parents reside between Olga and Doe Bay.

May 13, 1897 Mate Jenner, an old 49'er drowned in "Sameahmoo" Bay near Blaine last week. His boat capsized during a heavy wind.

July 8, 1897 Frank Shipman drowned in the Skagit River near Mount Vernon

September 16, 1897 Badly injured on Saturday, September 4, Mr. Robert Kittles Junior. Died at St Luke's Hospital, Whatcom, on Saturday September 11, age 30 years, buried on Jones Island beside hid mother who died several years ago. H leaves his father, 4 brothers and 1 sister. Also a daughter of M/M O. H. Culver, at New Whatcom, died on September 11th.

December 16, 1897 married Mr. Thomas Leavell of Whatcom and Miss Minnie Fry, of East Sound, Dec. 8, 1897 by Rev. Thomas L. Dyer, at the home of her parents, M/M John N. Fry, East Sound.
