Hazel Rasar, publications committee, reported the publication of several cemetery books and reported also progress on three continuing projects.

All publications are available to SVGS members at a 10% discount on the published price. If we know ahead of time, we can bring a specific publication for pick up at a general meeting, thus saving you postage. Contact Sharon Johnson if you desire her to bring a copy to one of our meetings.

Mount Vernon Cemetery publication is available for purchase for \$30.00. This publication covers burials at the Fir Street location from 1899 through 2000, the book includes maps of the cemetery, a complete alphabetical listing of burials including those without headstones, and an alphabetical listing of all veterans buried there. 305 pages

Forest Park in Concrete, WA publication is available for purchase for \$10.00. This publication also contains an alphabetical listing of all persons buried, plus an alphabetical veterans directory. Information is included on burials without headstones and also from an unknown source, which is presumed to be obituary type information on family relationships.

Bay View Cemetery, Bow Cemetery and Northern State Burials are computerized and in final stages of preparation for publication in the near future.

A new project, under the auspices of the Publication Committee will be started in the near future. This will involve the formation of a subcommittee to develop guidelines and criteria for a SKAGIT PIONEERS BOOK, for presentation to the Board of Directors. This could involve oral and/or written history of Skagit County pioneer families. The goal being to develop something similar to the 1906 History Book of Skagit and Snohomish Counties. The DAR Library receives a gift of the National Huguenot Society Library.

Following an agreement signed in early April 2003, the National Huguenot Society, headquartered in Minneapolis, Minnesota, has donated the contents of its entire library to the DAR Library in Washington, D.C. The collection, naturally, focuses on the history and genealogy of French Huguenot immigrants to the American colonies and the story of Protestants in France. Previously, the library has been housed in NHS's office and was only accessible in a very limited fashion. NHS wanted the materials to be placed in a large genealogical library and approached the DAR in late 2002. The Washington location will place the collection near some of the areas on the east coast that received large Huguenot populations in the 17th and 18th centuries.

The DAR Library will begin to catalog and arrange the collection in the near future. All holdings will appear in the DAR Library's catalog (www.dar.org). The books will remain a separate special collection within the library and be called The National Huguenot Society Collection. Members of the NHS will have complete access to the collection and free access to the DAR Library for the next ten years with presentation of a NHS membership card.

We hope that your patrons interested in French Huguenot ancestors will come to the DAR Library and use this important addition to our holdings.

Genealogical Resources

Resources at the WSL - Skagit County territorial census has been submitted to the Sec of State's office and are now online through their website. Hazel

New! - The State Library in cooperation with the State Archives is currently indexing census data collected in Washington. You may now search for individuals and view scanned images of original census documents. New data is being added weekly.

The Washington State Library has a small genealogy collection that deals only with Washington State. Visitors are extended courtesy service based on their ability to use resources on a self-serve basis. We are not able to offer any research or copying services. Please contact your local library first for assistance identifying resources which may be borrowed from our collection.

Newspapers. We hold microfilm copies of Washington newspapers from nearly all time periods. Most microfilm is available for interlibrary loan. We will loan any library system up to 10 reels of microfilm per request per person for a 3-week period (including mailing time), with no renewals. Your local library can assist you with this process. Information on newspapers is contained in the Washington State Union List of Newspapers on Microfilm, which is held in many libraries or may be borrowed through interlibrary loan Census. We have the Washington Territorial Census Rolls on microfilm covering 1859-1892. The census varies by county as to available dates. We have Federal census records for Washington State for 1850, 1860, 1870, 1900, 1910, and 1920. These may be borrowed via interlibrary loan. Some local genealogical societies have published indexes to these censuses, which may be identified in our catalog, and borrowed through interlibrary loan.

Death index. We have a copy of the Index to Vital Records (1907-1995), a.k.a Death Index, on microform. The microfilm (1907-1979) may be borrowed through interlibrary loan. Requests should indicate the year(s) desired. **Vital records.** Depending on the date, original birth, death, marriage, and divorce records are held by either the Washington State Department of Health Center for Health Statistics or the regional branches of the Washington State Archives. Our holdings do not include any original vital records.

Additional resources, such as city directories and the Washington name and subject index, are available in-house only. Self-service photocopies are .10 cents per page, and exact change is preferred.

1900 Census and PERSI

Heritage Quest has started loading 1900 census index data, and Texas is included in the first batch. The states loaded so far are AZ, CA, FL, HI, KS, MS, TX, UT, and WA. This means that between Heritage Quest and Ancestry Plus we now have online index coverage for all census years for Washington to supplement our Soundex and book indexes.
