SVGS' program for May 11 will be "How to Read a Cemetery." Studying cemeteries is a fascinating field. The full depth of what cemeteries can offer in terms of art and history certainly cannot be exhausted in one brief presentation. There are so many clues about our ancestors' lives to be found on their tombstones. Discovering these gravestone symbols provides fresh insight into their lives. We hope you will be inspired to learn more about studying grave-stones.

The SVGS' board hopes you will become inspired to practice your cemetery reading skills and volunteer to help read the Hawthorne Cemetery in Mount Vernon. Hawthorne is the final cemetery remaining to be read so SVGS can publish the gravestones' inscriptions. Such SVGS publications have proven highly valuable to Skagit County family researchers.

In the coming weeks the SVGS publications committee will be organizing teams of volunteers to help with: Reading the gravestones; logging the information into a database, proofreading the data; and finally, publishing the information. This is a sizable project for SVGS. But, it promises to be an educational and engaging genealogy project as well. So, we hope you will sign-up to join a team of volunteers at Hawthorne Cemetery this summer.

SVGS' program for Saturday, June 8 will be presented by Dr. Janice Lovelace. Dr. Lovelace will discuss how and where to find those lesser known company records relating to our ancestors who worked for the railroads.

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Since SVGS takes a break from meetings in July and August the next membership meeting will be on Saturday, September 14 (program to be announced.) No matter what exciting new directions your family research takes you this spring/summer, all of us on SVGS board wish you much success and satisfaction.

Comb Binding ...


