WASHINGTON STATE LIBRARY IN JEPORDY

GOVERNOR LOCKE WANTS TO CLOSE THE STATE LIBRARY FOREVER!!!

An SOS to all genealogy patrons to write to your State Rep and Gov. Locke to Protest this plan!!! Moving the Library to temporary quarters, Tumwater, near Olympia, has cost about \$1.5 million in one-time funding

The WSL was established by the Organic Act of the Territory of Washington as passed by Congress in 1853. Every state in the Union currently maintains a State Library Agency. If Locke eliminates the Library then Washington State will lose \$3 Million in Federal Funds. Over 50,000 State officials and government workers will lose their source of information through specialized collections of public policy. Expert professionals provide assistance and support to the public, students and state agencies.

These services substantially benefit rural libraries and also provide development services to all types and sizes of libraries in the state. It has the most complete collection of Washington State Newspapers, dating back to before statehood. No other Washington Library has the mandate to make this information available to the public at no charge. Locke's Budget proposal does not provide for an alternative provider or funds to continue this service. The budget calls for about \$ 9 million plus the \$ 3 million in Federal Funds.

The State Library opened on January 2, 2002 for customer's use. Visit the new location or call for info. The staff was able to keep all but a few services fully operational during the move. The Civil War Soldiers and Sailors, Bureau of Land Management Land patent database and all National Park Service sites were disconnected from the Internet at the direction of District Court Judge Royce Lamberth. This action stems from the compromising of access to Indian Trust Management data accessible through the same servers. Select DOI Web pages will be made available to the public through USGS with court approval. They will be reconnected at any time after January 8, 2002.

HAVE YOU EVER THOUGHT ABOUT THE FACT THAT WHEN OLDER FAMILY MEMBERS MOVE they start throwing things away that might be good leads for your research? When you find out they are moving, send them a check and tell them to use it for postage to mail you memorabilia, such as old letters and other family items, they don't want anymore. You might be amazed at what will show up.

HERITAGE QUEST has a new CD-ROM with the Index to Pension and Bounty Land Warrant applications for the Revolutionary War. If you are researching ancestors in that war this new index can help you quickly find the records. This is a companion to the Heritage Quest digital microfilm CD-ROMs that contain enhanced images of the National Archives M-805 micro-film series. More than 80,000 patriot's records are copied from the microfilm's National Archives and Records Administration.

System requirements: 95/98/ME/NT/2000, Pentium 100+, 16 MB RAM, 4xCD-ROM and 88 MB free hard drive space, available for \$ 1995.

Original Records on Digital Microfilm CD's are available for \$ 19.95 each. There are 898 CD-ROM's in this series. The new address for the Library is:
