1930 Census

The U.S. Census Bureau released original and confidential records on April 1, 2002. A gold mine for genealogists, history buffs and nosey neighbors. already have the census records from 1920 you can hope to learn what happened in that 10 year learning about their span; marital condition, and whether they actually worked, being they were in a "Great Depression". It tells what year they immigrated, where they were born and the language they spoke before coming to the United States.

SUBSCRIBE TO A HISTORICAL MAILING LIST

Historians of your state of interest have a lot of non-genealogical information in their mailing lists that will help you in your research. Remember most of these lists do not accept genealogical queries, but they frequently have historical questions. As with any other mailing list, you should not expect others to do your research for you. Transcriptions of early governmental legislative bodies may make reference to your ancestor if they were early settlers of the area. Locating your ancestors on the 1930 census won't be easy. I wish I had started a year ago. Prepare yourself for a lot of time that it will take to do a search. Anything you can do now will shorten the amount of time it will take when you finally decide it is time for your search.

If your ancestors lived in a small town you will have to search line by line and page by page.

Unlike the 1920 Census this 1930 census does not have a Soundex index for every state. Only 10 states and portions of two others have been indexed using the Soundex system. The 10 that have been indexed are Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia. Seven counties in Kentucky — Bell, Floyd, Harlan, Kenton, Muhlenberg, Perry and Pike — and the West Virginia counties of Fayette, Harrison, Kanawha, Logan, McDowell, Mercer and Raleigh.

There are old city directories and telephone books generally available in the reference sections of public libraries. Other sources might be; Social Security applications, old letters or envelopes, death certificates, birth records, naturalization records, ship manifests, wedding certificates, school records, church records, voter registration records and/or the 1920 Census.

For large cities look for city directories to find the address or use the geographic descriptions found in the T-1224 publication. You can use the microfilm at NARA of available city directories at http://www.nara.gov/genealogy/citydirs.html. These directories include every male of employable age, workers under the age of 20, male students, working women, widows, and girls of marriageable age.

M-1930 contains maps that show the streets within a county, city or political unit making up an Enumeration District. An Enumeration District is a basic geographic area of a size that could be covered by a single census taker within one census period. You need to know the ED number to search and each enumeration district is set up differently. Address indexes convert street addresses to ED numbers.

Those few cities that have been address indexed include most of North Carolina for virtually all cities in the state. The "Cross Index to Selected City Streets and Enumeration Districts" is on Microfilm series M1931. Akron, OH; Atlanta, GA; Baltimore, MD; Berkeley, CA; Bronx, Manhattan (interfiled) and Brooklyn, NY; Canton, OH; Chicago, IL; Cincinnati, Cleveland, and Dayton, OH; Denver, CO; Detroit MI; District of Columbia; Elizabeth, NJ; Erie, PA; Fort Wayne and Gary, IN; Grand Rapids, MI; Indianapolis, IN; Kansas City, KS. Long Beach and Los Angeles City and County, CA; Memphis, TN; Miami (includes Miami Beach and South Miami) FL; Newark, NJ; Oklahoma City, OK; Omahs, NE; Paterson, NJ; Peoria, IL; Phoenix, AZ; Philadelphia, PA; Queens, NY; Reading, PA; Richmond, (Staten Island), NY; Richmond, VA; San Antonio, TX.

San Diego and San Francisco. CA; South Bend, In; Tampa, FL; Tulsa, OK; Wichita, KS; and Youngstown, OH.

These web-sites are most useful for regions where neither of these indexes exist. Due to lack of resources not all cities are covered. Indexing was started during the depression years when the government was trying to create jobs. Following World War II, indexing was never resumed. The government has no plans to produce such an index, so it will be possible for private firms to do the job.










