
RENEW YOUR MEMBERSHIP

The Civil War in America

November 12, 2012 – June 1, 2013

The Civil War in America assembles more than 200 unique items, many of which have never been seen by the public, to commemorate the sesquicentennial of this nation's greatest military and political upheaval. Drawing from hundreds of thousands of items from across many collections of the Library of Congress, the materials included in this exhibition attest to the valor, sacrifices, emotions, and accomplishments of those in both the North and South whose lives were affected by the bitter conflict of 1861–1865.

Women at War



It has been estimated that some 400 women concealed their identities and donned uniforms, serving as soldiers on both sides of the conflict during the Civil War. In addition to the usual cursory medical examinations and ill-fitting uniforms, Frances Clayton's slim build and angular features made it possible for her to pass as a man and accompany her husband to the front. They fought together until his death at the Battle of Murfreesboro (Stones River), December 31, 1862 to January 2, 1863. After she left the army, Clayton's stor

The Draft Riots

On July 11, 1863, draft officers began drawing names in heavily Democratic New York City, where sentiment against abolition and conscription ran high and racial tensions had reached a boiling point. From July 13 to 17, 1863, New York erupted into four of the bloodiest days of mob violence in United States history. The uprising began with thousands of people foregoing work to demonstrate outside the draft office on Third Avenue. A stone hurled through an office window and the discharge of a pistol turned the demonstration into a riot. Surging into the draft office, the rioters smashed everything, then proceeded to the headquarters of the *New York Times* and the *New York Tribune*, and moved on to loot and burn the four-story Colored Orphan Asylum. Hundreds were injured and 105 killed.

Posts will be authored by forty individuals featured in the exhibition and are excerpts from their diaries, letters home, and published memoirs—all eyewitness accounts. These personal observations and declarations, from such well-known historical figures as Robert E. Lee and Clara Barton to those lesser known, will carry the narrative of the exhibition and represent both sides of the conflict in a modern social media format.

We Bid Farewell to FamilySearch.org's NewFamilySearch and Welcome Family Tree

Amy Tanner Thiriot has written an in-depth guide describing recent changes made to www.FamilySearch.org. She writes: "The Church genealogical database NewFamilySearch (NFS) has been frustrating for so many people, particularly those who do actual genealogical research and care about accuracy. NFS allowed people with no particular skill to upload sketchy aggregated online family trees (usually culled from Ancestral File, Ancestry, and Roots-Web) and have their data look as valid as the correct information.

"Family Search recently released a replacement for NFS. It is called Family Tree. So far, I'm impressed. It has solved some of the worst of the problems with NFS and whereas it was hardly worth correcting NFS, I've found it worthwhile to go in and start correcting the record in Family Tree."

Washington State Digital Archives

This terrific site already has more than 36 million searchable records online. Among them are birth, marriage, death, census, cemetery and naturalization records.

Washington State Library

To find your ancestor mentioned in Washington newspapers published between 1852 and 1889, click on Digital Collections and then on Historical Newspaper in Washington and use the Personal Name Search. Click on Genealogy for an overview of resources at the library. Take advantage of the free obituary lookup service, too.

Today, with much better weather, we drove through Counties Armagh and Monaghan where I have ancestors from before the Famine Times. The countryside is green rolling hills (40 shades of green, indeed) with lots of sheep grazing peacefully. One surprise, many of the sheep have red or blue backs. Turns out the farmer paints his herd one color to distinguish it from his neighbor's herd as the sheep often meander between hedgerows.

There are two St. Patrick's Cathedrals in Armagh; one Catholic the other Protestant. As in much of Northern Ireland, there is dissension between the two groups, although the animosity has been greatly reduced. We visited the Catholic cathedral as my ancestors were Roman Catholic. I'm sure we'll become jaded after seeing more cathedrals, but this one is stunning. It makes the US National Cathedral look unworthy in comparison. And the US National Cathedral is grand.


After lunch in Armagh, we drove through the countryside enjoying the scenery. We stopped in a small town (population 240) called Middletown. We happened into Lennon's, one of several watering holes in this tiny town. The bartender gave us samples of Jamesons and Bushmills--two of the best Irish Whiskey (for those of you who are not whiskey drinkers--Bob and Steve ignore this). My, the Bushmills is smooth. It isn't my drink of choice. I still prefer a pint o' Guiness but it's not bad.

We headed south to County Monaghan which is in the Republic of Ireland. The only hint that we were in another country was a sign: "Welcome to County Monaghan". Apparently the animosity between the two countries has been greatly reduced!

We returned to Belfast to drop off our rental "motorcar" and promptly got lost. Our GPS passed to the Great Beyond and failed us completely. We stopped at a local shopping mall and got superb directions from a store manager. Every where we have gone in both countries, the local Irish people have gone out of their way to make us feel welcome. They kept telling us that there are crabby Irish-men, but I really think that's a bunch of Blarney. We can't say enough good things about the wonderful folks we encountered on the Emerald Isle.

24 September 2012

On Saturday, we sailed on a lovely ferry from Belfast to Cairnryan. Stena Lines has several ferries that cross the Irish Sea; ours went to the northwest coast of Scotland where we boarded a bus to Ayr, then a train to Glasgow where we hired a taxi to our hotel.

Whilst (a UK term) on the ferry, we sat next to a lovely couple from Northern Ireland. He was definitely Protestant and gave me an earful about Irish and Scots-Irish history. But he was very helpful in pointing out various landmarks as we sailed. The Stena Line I ferries are not at all like Washington State Ferries or BC ferries. They are much larger (10 decks) but not as large as an aircraft carrier. They are also far more luxurious than our local ferries (and aircraft carriers): swivel chairs with tables, large screen TVs, several restaurants; all that's missing is a Grand Ballroom! Not quite the way my ancestors sailed into Glasgow.

Ellis Island Immigration Museum Archive Relocated

The National Park Service has moved treasures from the [Ellis Island Immigration Museum](#) in New York Harbor to a federal storage center due to the effects of Hurricane Sandy.

Oct. 29, the hurricane flooded Ellis Island and water filled the basement of the Immigration Museum, which houses the Great Hall where millions of immigrants started their lives in the United States.

Fortunately, the water didn't touch the museum's archive of records and immigrant artifacts, which were located elsewhere in the building. But it did knock out the island's electricity, wreaking havoc on the museum's carefully controlled climate and causing mold to grow on the artifacts and condensation to build up on walls.

A Ten Year Book Project comes to fruition

“Anders Edvin Johnson immigrated to the United States with a friend in New York City, April 1, 1889 on the S.S. Alaska. After being processed through the Castle Garden Immigrant Receiving Station, they traveled to their final destination, San Francisco. After working in California and Tacoma, in 1895 Edvin purchased a farm in the Cedardale area south of Mount Vernon. He farmed this property for 51 years.” Submitted by SVGS board member *Sharon Johnson*.

The above family history quote, along with photos and genealogical data contribute to the making of historical stories of approximately 600 individuals of countless families who made up the early years and growth of Skagit County. These stories and genealogical data were submitted by descendants of sturdy pioneer’s and folks telling the story of their parents and by some, their own life story.

The project started 10 years ago this fall and was spear-headed by board members and co-chairs Hazel Rasar and Dan Royal along with a sub-committee of the Publication Committee. This book project was differentiated as it was and is to be a legacy book based and modeled on the still popular “An Illustrated History of Snohomish & Skagit County” published in 1906 by Interstate Publishing Company. Our book, “**Skagit County, Washington & Its People!**” will be a stand apart from the more data oriented books of the society; such as the soon to be published “Hamilton Cemetery” book. It will also book end the societies 25th Anniversary celebrations started last year.

The society would like to invite SVGS members – past and present - submitters to the book and the general public to hear a 45 minute presentation as Hazel Rasar and Dan Royal share their journey to see this publication come to its completion. They will also share photos and a reading of a few of the submitted stories. Facsimile copies of the books will also be available for viewing.

Barbara's Travelogues continues

We left Yorkshire and the lovely pasture lands, taking the train to London. It's about 250 miles. Including two stops, the trip took 2.5 hours. Yup, you might say it was a high speed train! It was hard to see much scenery at that speed, but the trip was quite comfortable including trolley service. Trolley service: just like Harry Potter and the Hogwarts Express, except there were no magic chocolate frogs.

London is an interesting city. The Black Cabs (now of various colors) are inexpensive, fast, and very closely licensed. It takes 3 years to obtain a taxi license as the driver must know every nook and cranny of the town. We wound up using taxis more often than the tube. In fact, we only rode the tube a couple of times. We arrived in London at King[s] Cross Station and immediately headed for Platform 9 3/4 (see below). We then took the tube/underground to Victoria Station. Our trip took about 40 minutes; it's normally about 10-15 but just past Victoria Station, the route was shut down due to a "person under a train". We never did find out what happened but according to the locals, this is a frequent method of suicide. Yuk.

The city is easy to walk about as it is fairly flat, but everyone is in a Major Hurry. It's crowded, noisy and folks are pushy and a bit rude. We were quite glad to leave town today.

On Tuesday, we toured Westminster Abbey which is spectacular with all the burial plaques and elaborate tombs of Kings and Queens. A very special part of our visit was to the plaque for Major Andre who was a hero to the English although we upstart Colonists hanged him as a traitor. Major Andre recruited Benedict Arnold to turn over West Point to the British during that little "dust up" in the 1770s. A dear Canadian friend, Basil Andre Robinson, was a descendant of Major Andre. It turns out that when he asked a guide where to find his plaque, he had to look it up. He then took us past several roped off areas to see the plaque. Although photography is not allowed, he discreetly turned his back so we could take a photo. Sadly it was quite blurry, but the moment was very special for Roger and me.

The next day, we took a hop on, hop off bus for a tour of the usual tourist sites in town. At 12:45, we had tickets to tour Buckingham Palace. Sadly, HRH Elizabeth was not there to invite us to tea. But the Palace is lovely: 770+ rooms, 240-some bedrooms and only 78 bathrooms. Imagine cleaning house. OK, she has over 1200 staff to do the dirty work.

All I have is my Norwegian Houseboy to help.

After touring the Palace, which has so many pieces of priceless artwork by painters such as Van Dyke, Rubens, Rembrandt, and porcelain vases (say Vahzes), urns, gold and silver plated trays, goblets, etc. that it truly boggles the mind; we hopped back on a bus to head for the Tower of London to view the Crown Jewels.

If you appreciate beautiful jewelry, you will see jaw dropping pieces of art. There were scepters, crowns, orbs, swords, necklaces. Unbelievably beautiful with sapphires, diamonds, rubies, pearls. Most of them "stored" there until a Royal Event, usually a coronation. Some of the jewels are crowns of previous monarchs, so they stay on display only. The value of these jewels has to be in the billions of pounds/dollars. That's if one could place a value on them.

Once outside the Crown Jewels wing, we spotted a soldier in a traditional red jacket and bear skin helmet. He stands very still except every few minutes, he does a high step and marches back and forth. Just like one sees on the telly. We also saw several Beefeaters and a young man dressed in a period uniform that I did not recognize. I asked him what period he represented and he cheerfully answered that it was from 1668 and it was a Fusilier uniform. He and the Beefeater were quite chatty, glad to inform us about the traditions they represented.

One of the traditions is that they are Keepers of the Ravens. Ravens in the past protected the Tower soldiers from disease by eating the vermin that hung about the Tower. At one point, an observatory was built that frightened the ravens away and disease ensued. So the observatory was removed and the ravens were brought back. They are now coddled and are a very important part of the Tower tradition.

The two soldiers and I had a great chat about ravens being sacred to Native Americans, and we teased each other about that "little dust up in 1776" which they claimed we won because we had help from the French!

Today we took the train (high speed) to Salisbury where we took a bus to Stonehenge and back to the Cathedral. Those of you (and that's most of you) know I'm a science geek. I've studied a lot about Stonehenge and never dreamed I would ever be standing on Salisbury Plain gazing at the lintels and uprights of this mysterious site. Wow! It was awesome.

Roger wanted to visit Salisbury Cathedral as that was the inspiration for Ken Follett's "Pillars of the Earth". It is the tallest spire in England at 140-some metres. (Note I used the English/Canadian spelling...we've gone a tad native). Speaking of Ken Follett, Roger was able to hear him speak in the Churchill War Rooms on Tuesday night. And, yes indeed, he now has an autographed copy of Follett's latest tome. It takes up quite a bit of room in his luggage!

We are now in Portsmouth and will be touring the Navy Yard here. This is where Eisenhower had his headquarters for Operation Overlord--the D-Day Landing. Oh yes, Navy folk, there's a very old sailing ship nearby called the HMS Victory and we plan on touring it tomorrow. Eat your heart out, ye Stennis sailor.



New York City Introduces Online Database for Its Potter’s Field

For more than a century, to be buried on Hart Island, off the coast of the Bronx, was to be essentially forgotten. It served as a burial place for unknown or indigent people. Close to one million people have been buried in the city's Potter's Field since 1869.

Until recently, the names of the dead — when they could be identified — were simply scribbled into ledgers, which were largely inaccessible to the public. But on Wednesday, the city's Department of Correction, which runs the cemetery, introduced a searchable database, available on its Web site, for people to look up the names of those buried on the island. Stretching back to 1977, there are more than 65,000 names in the registry, and the plan is to add more names as they become available.

A fire on the island in the late 1970s that destroyed some important records, officials said, including some records from 1956 to 1960 and several years of records from the 1970s. The available records online are mostly for deaths that occurred in 1977 or later.


When visiting the site, a warning appeared stating that the database only supports Internet Explorer version 7.0 and up. I find that sad, as there is no current version of Internet Explorer for the Macintosh. However, I used Firefox on a Macintosh and everything seemed to work properly.

The dead can be searched by name — first or last — age, gender and year of death. The database also provides information on the place of death. Using the database seems to be very simple: fill in the blanks for the information you know and then click on SEARCH. Click on the image above to see a larger screen capture of the search form.



Monday, 8 October

Barbara's Travelogues continues

We are now in Paris: Our last day before heading home. This will be the last you hear from us till we are back in Sedro Woolley. Of course, we'll pick up the Beagles, stock up on food, and do a few loads of laundry.

On Friday, we visited Southwick ("suthick") House—a grand mansion—where Eisenhower had his headquarters near Portsmouth on the south of England. The map room is preserved just as it was when he gave the orders to proceed on 6 June 1944.

Later that afternoon, we toured the historic dockyard where we walked around the HMS Victory which was Admiral Lord Nelson's ship during the Battle of Trafalgar. What amazed me was short lil' ol' me had to duck under the overheads. The ship was built for fighting not comfort.

We had quite a wait between dinner and boarding the ferry. We sat in the bar of our B&B/restaurant. This was such a treat as all the locals came in for their nightly pint (or two or ...). They got quite chummy with us, even offering to buy us a drink. All I drank was tea as I was way too tired at that point. I'm sure after we left they had a great time talking about us Yanks.

To journey to France, we took an overnight ferry from Portsmouth to Caen. We had a "state room" which consisted of two small beds and a tiny bathroom/head. The boat sailed at 10:45 and arrived in Caen at 5:45 GMT. So not a lot of sleep, especially when the PA system woke the entire ship up at 4:45! We didn't see much of the English Channel until we drove to Arromanches. And we are now driving on the right hand side of the road, although the French drivers are just as much in a hurry as those in the UK.

The last two days have been very moving. Arromanches took the brunt of Allied forces on D-Day. An artificial port was constructed following the landing of the men. The port was an engineering marvel; the number of men participating and the number of dead are beyond comprehension for those of us familiar with today's style of warfare. There were about 1.5 million troops in England preparing for the invasion; over 25,000 US soldiers died during the invasion.

We strolled through the American Cemetery which was somber. I defy anyone not to shed a tear seeing all those graves lined up row after row. So many young men from all the allied countries made the ultimate sacrifice to defeat Hitler.

This morning we took the train from Caen to Paris. The train was very fast but the track was very old. It may be the remains of WWI, it was so rough. Once in Paris, we took a cab to our hotel near the Eiffel Tower. We are on the fourth (5th in the US and Canada) floor; fortunately there is a lift, but it fits only one person and one suitcase. Cozy.

We settled in, then wandered about the streets of Paris. We found a restaurant nearby (there must be 20+ choices) and ate. Roger ordered a hot dog with cheese as that was the only item he saw that he liked. Well...it was a foot-long sausage with a delicious fromage/cheese on a baguette. Not exactly what we Americans consider a hot dog.

Then we caught a bus to the Louvre and promptly got lost. We seem really good at that. We walked about 1 1/2 miles, crossing the Seine near the Place de la Concorde and walked through the Jardin de Tuileries/Tuilerie Garden in a heavy drizzle. By the time we finally got to the Louvre, we were wet, tired and the line to get in was waaaay too long in the rain. Sadly, we are both "museumed out" and I never got to see the Mona Lisa. Sniff.

We returned to the hotel to just plain rest before dinner and our final night in a hotel. We leave Paris tomorrow at 12:40 pm and arrive in Seattle at 4:40 pm. Gosh, just a 4-hour flight, right? When we land a SeaTac it will be 12:40 am "body time". Then customs and a 2-hour ride home. Don't call us, s'il vous plait!

ROOTS Rocks!

Inspire the Next Generation of Genealogists!

A common dilemma genealogy societies face is how to replace the current generation of genealogists and members. How do you get young people interested in genealogy? In Burlington, Washington an innovative community collaboration is experimenting with creative ways to engage this next generation in the fascinating study of family history.

The Skagit Valley Genealogical Society, Burlington Public Library and the Burlington-Edison North High School are uniting as community partners to launch an innovative family history research project for teenagers -- "Making Connections Through ROOTS." The objective of the ROOTS project is to improve 11th grade students' information literacy (basic research skills) by engaging teens in the process of researching their own unique family history. The volunteers will gain training and have access to new genealogy resources made possible by the project.

The Skagit Valley Genealogical Society will help provide "genealogist mentors" volunteers to serve as research guides to the teen researchers. The mentors and teen researchers begin working together in Oct. 2013. Mentors and teens will meet weekly on Thursdays at the Burlington Library for approximately 20 weeks. At the close of the project each teen's unique family history will be presented at a public celebration in June 2014.

A field trip to the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) branch in Seattle, and living history programs will also be part of the project's curriculum and keep the project engaging for the teens and genealogists alike.

The ROOTS project is a fresh new concept for libraries and genealogical societies to partner together to help teens sharpen their research skills. ROOTS is a pilot program that will create a curriculum and best practices template for other public libraries, genealogy societies and schools to replicate in their communities.

An orientation for prospective genealogist volunteers will be held on Monday, May 20 from 1:00-3:00pm at the Burlington Library Conference Room. Application materials will be available. The deadline to apply to be a genealogist mentor volunteer is Friday, May 31. If you cannot attend the May 20th orientation contact the project coordinator. Arrangements can be made to give the presentation to a small group and for you to receive the application materials prior to the May 31 deadline.

Free training in family history research fundamentals will be offered to the volunteers. This training will be held every Monday in June and July (June 3 through July 29) at the Burlington Public Library from 1-3pm. Everyone is welcome to attend these trainings which are offered free and are open to the mentors as well as anyone who is interested in learning the basics of family history research.



DOES AN OLD MAP REVEAL FATE OF THE LOST COLONY OF ROANOKE?

Every American school child learns the story of the Lost Colony of Roanoke. But could its fate have been hiding in plain sight all along, behind some patches on a map? It's a major clue that could eventually solve a 400-year-old mystery.

According to the Daily Telegraph, scholars in the U.S. and U.K., studying the 16th century La Virginea Pars map painted by James White, think they have found clues that reveal where the colonists may have vanished to: the confluence of the Chowan and Roanoke rivers.



Experts from the First Colony Foundation and the British Museum in London discussed their findings at a scholarly meeting on the campus of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Their focus: the "Virginia Pars" map of Virginia and North Carolina created by explorer John White in the 1580s and owned by the British Museum since 1866. 

Allen Family Foundation grant for the “Making Connections Through ROOTS” Project, the Burlington Library now has available and free to the public the genealogy databases: Ancestry.com Library Edition and Genealogy Bank (historic newspapers). The Heritage Quest database is still available as well. These genealogy databases are a great aid to researchers who come to the SVGS Genealogy section and can now research an extended array of resources – both printed material and online. The Burlington Library is the only library in Skagit County to offer the Ancestry.com and Genealogy bank.

SVGS is leading the way in the community in promoting awareness of genealogy by helping to bring these databases to community based researchers. Many of these database researchers cannot afford the annual subscriptions but wish to pursue their family history research. SVGS’ partnership in the ROOTS project is demonstrating to the public that an interest in family research is growing rapidly across the country. With a comprehensive collection of between 1900-2000 books and the close-at-hand access to Ancestry.com Library Edition and other genealogy databases, the SVGS Library is becoming a popular research destination.

You do not have to have a Burlington Library card to access these databases. Ancestry.com Library Edition can only be accessed at the library. The Genealogy Bank database of United States historical newspapers is accessible via wifi at the library or online through the Burlington Library website with a library card (or reciprocal card). For more information on how to use these databases ask the Burlington Library reference desk librarian or a SVGS Library volunteer from 11am –1pm on Mondays.

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

Does Genealogy Begin at Home?

When did you discover that you'd been bitten by the genealogy bug? Did you have a grandmother or grandfather who took you on trips to visit older relatives or to visit ancestral places? Maybe your parents were proud of their heritage and instilled a free-form family history in you...

My journey was a fortunate one. My parents owned an apartment building on Damen Avenue in Chicago – between Waveland Avenue and Addison Street – for Cubs fans, this means that you were blocks away, directly behind Wrigley Field! The building was originally owned by my great grandfather, but when he died, my father bought the building from the family. He offered apartments to family members at reasonable rents and in return, I was immersed in my multicultural heritage. My full name is Leslie Renee Catherine (Gignac) Drewitz and I am German, French, Hungarian, Scots-Irish, Pennsylvania Dutch, English, Irish and Scottish – whew!; so I've had many avenues to explore and many opportunities to make friends across the world.

My mother's maternal grandmother – who lived with my grandparents in the apartment above ours – was in her early seventies when I was a little girl. It was in their apartment that I learned the value of family heritage. I didn't realize it at the time, but I was given a priceless gift! My great grandmother's siblings would visit often and they would reminisce about their childhoods; their parents and grandparents; the homes that they had lived in; and all manner of stories – some not fit for little ears! But the first lesson that I learned was to be very quiet. This meant *not* asking for a piece of that coffee cake from that awesome German bakery down the street (you'll never know how I suffered through that...), learning how to suppress a sneeze, *not* taking a bathroom break and of course – never *EVER* asking a question. In other words, I never interrupted. By following these rules, I was assured stories that would make me laugh, cry and wonder...

Now, I work at a suburban Chicago public library and I am fortunate enough to oversee the Genealogy Club there. I am instructor, lecturer and mentor of all things genealogy within this club. There are many things that I repeat over and over – such as cite your sources and stay organized – but the one thing that I stress time and again is, '*When doing an Oral History Interview, never EVER interrupt!*' I usually get a perplexed look and am asked why? I mean, the purpose of interviewing is to *INTERVIEW*, right? Well, that's partially right...

Consider this. If you have ever conducted an interview of a family member, how many stories do you think you have missed because you interrupted? Probably a few... In a successful interview, you should come away with stories – in which you hadn't prepared questions for.

Please take this tip...

When interviewing someone, let them talk. And talk. And talk... After all, that's why we bring extra paper and pencils, tapes and memory sticks to an interview – to be prepared. You can always edit out repetition or stories not related to your project; but you will never recapture a story that was never told. I have found that by remaining quiet – letting people talk – one story will invariably lead to another and maybe another. Some-times, you hit the genealogical jackpot!

My technique?

Ask a question and let it go where it may. The only time you should speak is to answer a direct question – like, '*What was her name again?*' Wait for the interviewee to stop and look at you expectantly *before* you ask your next question. This technique will guarantee you success every time!

Have You Used the FamilySearch Free Lookup Service?

1. **UPDATE:** Please note the comment posted below by Nathan W. Murphy of the Family History Library: "GOOD NEWS -- you can now use this service up to five times a week. The previous limit had been five times a month."

This must be the best-kept secret in genealogy! Well, it isn't really a secret as it is documented on several web pages on [FamilySearch.org](https://www.familysearch.org). However, in my travels, I have never met anyone who has used this valuable service. In fact, most of the genealogists  I have talked with have never heard of FamilySearch's free lookup service. This surprises me because (1.) it is a chance to easily obtain valuable genealogy information from the Family History Library in Salt Lake City and (2.) because it is available free of charge.

FamilySearch provides a free lookup service for genealogy books and Microfilms that are available at the renowned Family History Library in Salt Lake City. The free service does ask you to supply specific information. The folks in Salt Lake City are not prepared to answer questions of, "Please send me all the information you have about my great-grandfather (insert name here)." However, if you can specify a book and page number, or a specific image on a reel of microfilm, the personnel at the Family History Library will gladly look at that page or image and (in most cases) scan the entire page and email it to you for free.

What's not to like about this service?

You do need to do a bit of homework before using this service. At a minimum, you must provide:

The name of the individual as it appears in the book.

2. The book title
3. The page number(s)

Next, check the Family History Library Catalog at <https://familysearch.org/catalog-search> to see if that book is available in the Family History Library's collection. If so, make a note of the Call Number.

Once you have the required information, fill out  the online **Photoduplication Request form** at https://lds.qualtrics.com/SE/?SID=SV_9tdS7lqbTCW30kR.

Assuming you supplied enough information for the Family History Library employee to find the book, you will receive the reply and (usually) a scanned image of the page within a few days.

So how do you find the page number of a book that contains information about your ancestor? I suspect there are several ways but I would always start with Google Books at <http://books.google.com>. You can find tens of thousands of genealogy books there along with a few million other books covering a wide variety of topics. I would search for the name of the person I seek to see if anything about him or her has been published in a book.

Comment: As a genealogist, you really should be familiar with Google Books as it is another free and valuable service. If you are not yet familiar with Google Books, this is a good time to learn!

Keep in mind that Google Books scans **ALL** the pages of all the books it digitizes. That includes books both in and out of copyright. For books that are obviously out of copyright (normally anything prior to 1923 for U.S. Publications), Google Books will display the entire page to you. For books out of copyright, you won't need to use the FamilySearch Free Lookup Service as the same image is already available to you on Google Books.

However, for books printed in the past 90 years, Google cannot legally display entire pages to you without the author and/or publisher's permission. Instead, Google displays only a snippet from that page. Typically, you only see a paragraph or two, showing the words immediately before and after the name you specified. If that snippet happens to contain all the information you need, consider yourself lucky. However, my experience has been that the snippet is only a "teaser" and does not display everything I need.

What do you do if you want to see the entire page, or several pages from the book? The answer is to use FamilySearch's free lookup service. Assuming the Family History Library does have the book and the information you supplied does point to the appropriate page, an image of the entire page will be sent to you in email. I am no lawyer but I believe U.S. Copyright laws allow libraries to look up information for patrons upon request and send limited photocopies or scanned images whereas Google and other providers of information cannot legally supply similar images in large quantities to everyone.

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You may never need to use the FamilySearch free lookup service. However, if you do have the need, this is a valuable service that is free. You don't need to fly to Salt Lake City to obtain what you need.

If you wish to use the FamilySearch free lookup service, I would urge you to first read Nathan W. Murphy's description on the FamilySearch Blog of how it all works at <https://familysearch.org/blog/en/google-books-free-copies-pages-family-history-library-books/>. Nathan even supplies screenshots showing the step-by-step process of using Google Books to find snippets of genealogy information.
