Some Old Medical Terms

Below is a small list of medical related terms and below that links to several Web sites for additional information.

ague: Often used name for malarial fever or chills.

apoplexy: Stroke

bleeding, bloodletting: Draining a patient's blood, either by lancing the flesh or by applying live leeches.

calomel: Widely prescribed drug throughout the first half of the century. Thought to be a purgative because it caused heavy salivation and had a laxative effect. Highly toxic. Large doses destroyed patient's teeth and gums, caused oral ulcers, hair loss, sometimes facial deformities, and unbeknownst to the physicians of the time, heavy metal poisoning.

catarrh: Frequently used for any inflammation of the mucous membranes, especially in the nose and throat.

consumption: Tuberculosis.

dyspepsia: Indigestion.

gripe/la grippe: Influenza.

jalap: A powder used as a cathartic.

lung fever: Pneumonia.

miasma: Bad air or poisonous effluvium thought to be responsible for many diseases.

SSDI Access is Now Limited



Judy Russell, author of *The Legal Genealogist* blog, has written about the new restrictions now in place on the Security Death Master File — also known as the Social Security Death Index (SSDI). There is both bad news and good news:

Bad News: there are new restrictions on what was public domain information that can be useful to genealogists.

Good News: the restrictions apply only for records of individuals who died within the past three calendar years. I don't like that but suspect most genealogists can live with the restriction.

Archive.Org Unindexed--Well not Quite
US passport applications are on Archive.org at no charge. The Allen County Public Library in Fort Wayne, Indiana, has allowed their microfilm copy to be digitized. The problem for most users is that the film on Archive.org is not indexed.

The US Passport Applications, 1795-1905 are indexed on Fold3.com. Non-subscribers to the site can search the passport application from 1795-1905 on Fold3.com and view "mini" versions of the documents and source information without a membership. This is done after searching and clicking on "quick look" after the search results come up.

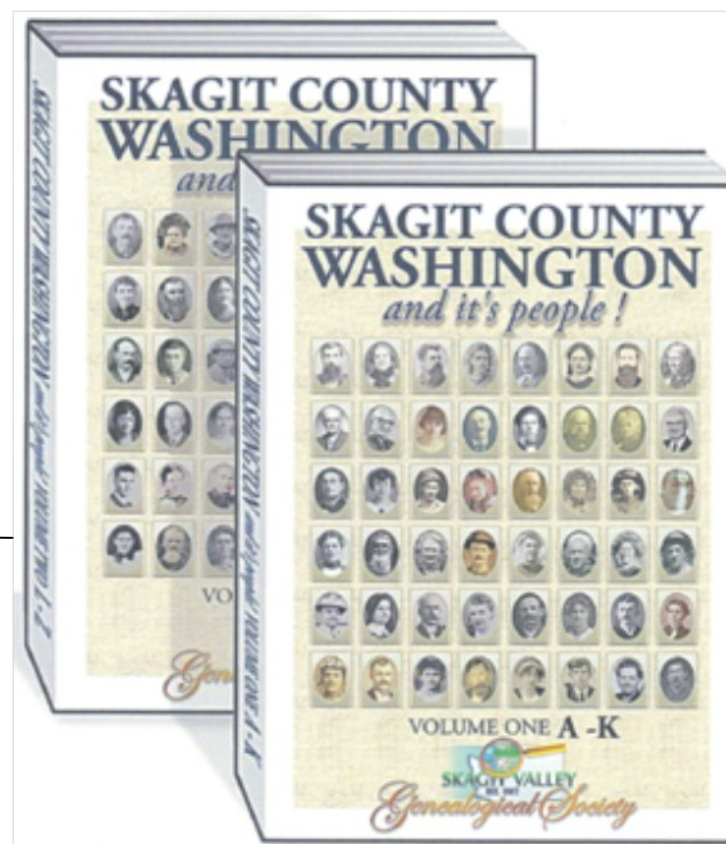

New Congressional Bill Proposes to Limit Access to the Death Master File/Social Security Death Index

SSDI Unfortunately, this is no surprise. The genealogy community has been watching the trends to stop access to public records and Congress has been pressured for some time to restrict one of the more important tools for genealogists. Sadly, if this bill passes, identity thieves will find it easier to steal money than ever before. (See my earlier article about that at <http://goo.gl/z8vHFX>.) The Records Preservation and Access Committee, a joint committee of the Federation of Genealogical Societies, the National Genealogical Society, and the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies, has been watching this issue for years. The committee reports: The Bipartisan Budget Bill 2014 includes a revenue –generating provision that limits access to the Death Master File/Social Security Death Index. The provisions are identical to bills IAJGS and the genealogical community have been opposing in submitted statements to the US Congress for several years as there are no provisions to permit genealogists to have immediate access nor the special categories of genealogists that the genealogical community have agreed are to be given immediate access while the rest of us may wait a few years. The budget bill includes penalties for violations \$1,000 per violations with a cap of \$250,000 per person violator which is included in the revenue generating provisions.

Remembrance World War I Centenary

2014 marks the 100th anniversary of the outbreak of the first World War in which more than 4 million Americans and over 600,000 Canadians would eventually serve. With the death of Canada's last surviving WWI veteran in 2010, and America's in 2011, the war has now passed from living memory.

To commemorate the centenary, many more resources are being made available online which can help you learn more about your WWI ancestors .

This is part of an article in the Internet Genealogy magazine Dec/Jan 2014. It was written by Carol Richey.

It has commemorative sites that you can go to, such as www.livesofthefirstworldwar.org. This site aims to profile more than 8 million men and women from Britain and the Commonwealth who played a role in the war both on the home front and who served. Another site www.canadaatwar.ca, which is dedicated to Canadians who served; <http://firstworldwar.com> is a multimedia history of the conflict which contains primary documents, details of significant battles, memoirs and diaries. They have many more site from American resources, also a site that examines WWI remittance listed on the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC) Archive.

This article has many more sources that are not listed and it also gives an article on obtaining your WWI ancestor's service records

Washington State Archives is Running Out of Space to Store its History

The Washington State Archives is overflowing with boxes of records and other items worth preserving. As a result, each new box of historic materials generated by the Inslee administration forces a box of older keepsakes from preceding executives, state leaders, Supreme Court justices and others to be shifted around in the 47,000-square-foot building, or shipped out. Birth, death, and marriage records are also crammed into the diminishing available space.

Secretary of State Kim Wyman, who oversees the archives, is seeking \$250,000 for a study to put a new facility in the Olympia area to house the archives and state library. She's also asked for \$105,900 to secure a multi-year lease for 25,000 square feet of warehouse space and \$707,500 to pay for shelving and equipment. This week, she got the good news that the Senate and the House had each included money in their proposed supplemental budgets.

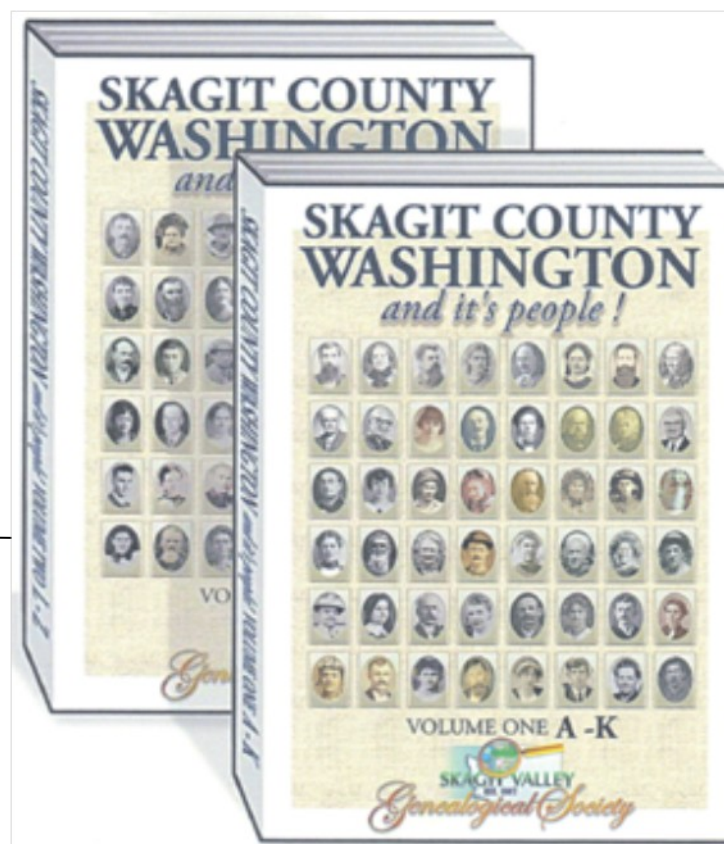

Orders for Microfilm and Fiche Will Be Restricted During April, 2014

The Granite Mountain Vault will be shifting a large amount of films into their newly renovated space.

This entails moving half a million rolls of film, and numerous cabinets of fiche and digital media. Since it will be risky to pull items during this time, the Family History Library will not be able to order microfiche or any microfilms above 1,881, 705. Film and fiche with numbers less than 1,881,704 and lower can still be ordered.

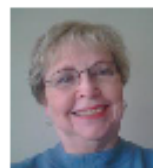

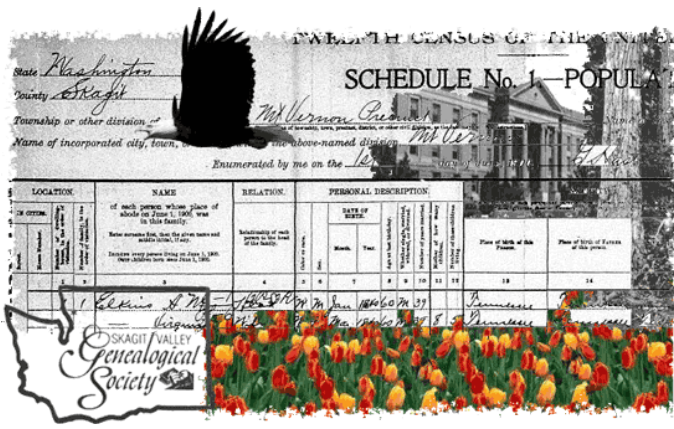
SVGS needs to branch out throughout the county. We need to try to involve Anacortes, LaConner, Sedro Woolley and upriver Concrete.

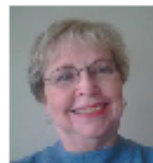

This is an excerpt from some of my genealogy that was sent to me by my cousin who has worked more than 20 years on our one family.

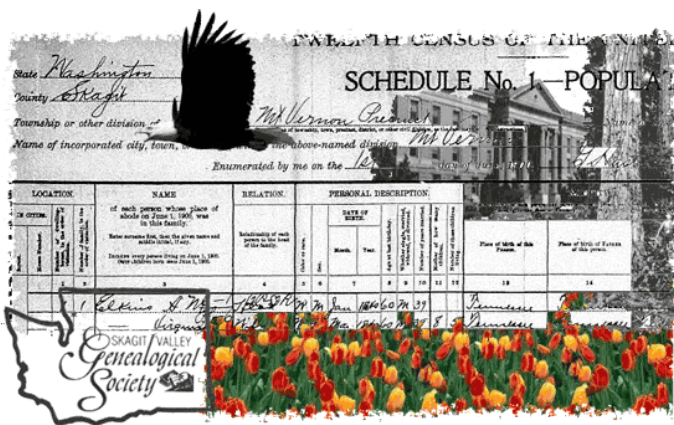
William Logsdon, Sr. was born 11 Nov 1652 in Blunham, England; died ca 1737 in Carroll Co, Maryland. William married ca 1702 in Fort Tobacco, Maryland to Honora O'Flynn, who was born ca 1681 in Kerry Co, Ireland.

William entered the colonies Jan 21, 1674— listed as passenger on board a ship captained by Samuel Smith.

Honora O'Flynn was a beautiful and vivacious Irish girl who was kidnapped in Ireland and brought to Maryland by a sea captain for barter. She was bought by William Logsdon and later became his wife. Most of the kidnapped girls were traded for tobacco. Honora was apious Catholic and it was through her that the Catholic faith appears in the family line. (This story has been passed down through the family.)

BLACK SHEEP ANCESTORS AND THEIR RECORDS

We all have them, so don't shy away from them; use them as they usually leave wonderful records. We normally hear about them as stories passed down through the families. The next step is to prove the story. You need to know where you are going before you can start out on this discovery trip. Write out the story, combining the various versions you have heard. Where there are differences, preface them with the person's name and/or color code the differences. For example: Jonathon was hung in 1886 [Aunt Mable noted that he was shot in 1887]. Now create a research plan noting all the resources you can use to help. Here are some places to look. Court records, coroner reports, military records, convicts, prison records, wild west and notorious characters, newspapers, and PERSI (Periodical Source index). Now execute your research plan and make a report. How much of the story was true? Which parts were held with a grain of truth? You might find you may need to rewrite the story. 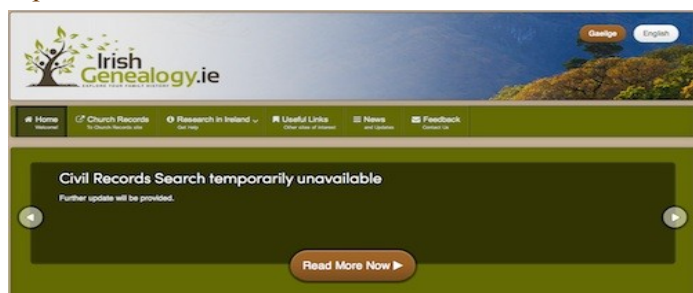

The Irish government closed part of its genealogy website on Friday, after the country's data protection commissioner warned that potentially sensitive personal details were available to all.

[Irish Genealogy](#), a website at <http://www.irishgenealogy.ie/en> created by the Department of Arts, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, offered people born or married in Ireland the ability to search for civil records such as birth certificates as part of their research into



their heritage.

The online records contained data such as dates of birth and mothers' maiden names, information which is frequently used as security questions for accounts such as online banking. That information is not legally defined as "sensitive" under Irish data protection law, but the commission stepped in to prevent the data anyway.

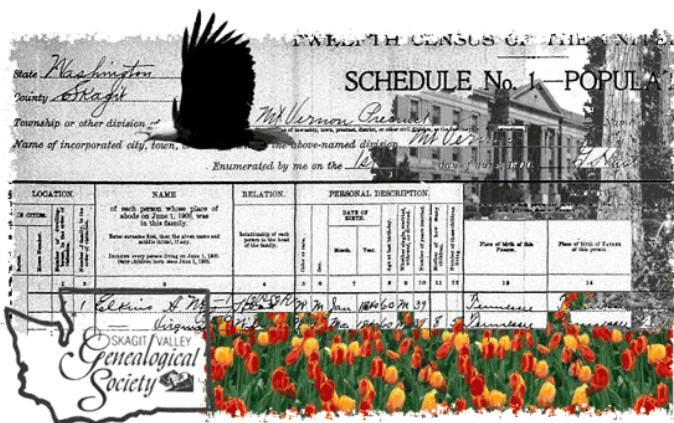
Hawaii's state archives are going digital. Soon, from the comfort of your home you can check records that include your genealogy and marriage licenses.

Paper state government records have been preserved at the archives for decades. However, for years now the government has gone paperless for many documents and that became a problem. A team is now working on how to store the digital data properly to make it available for everyone online.

Officials said legislative records will go online first, but the more than half a million records will eventually include historic documents, such as an 1849 petition.

A few of the documents are already online. The remainder are expected to be completed in October 2015.

Huge New King County, Washington, Database Unveiled

The following announcement was written by the Seattle Genealogical Society:

The Seattle Genealogical Society is proud to announce the availability of a huge database, the SGS King County Court Cases Index, 1881-1980, or KC3I for short. This index contains over 1.7 million records. Of these, divorces and other end-of marriage cases comprise over 700,000 of the entries, and probate and similar cases account for nearly 300,000 more.

The KC3I was created over a ten year period by a small but resolute group of SGS volunteers from over 100 boxes of index cards from the Chicago Title Company. It is an index of **ALL** King County court cases that could potentially affect property rights, and therefore the title to property from before 1881 through 1980. In addition to divorce and probate cases, the KC3I also includes all King County court cases involving name changes, community property agreements and guardianships, among others. Nearly 80,000 hours of volunteer time went into the creation of the KC3I.

As its name suggests, the KC3I is an index only. It does not contain abstracts or summaries of these cases. A search of this index:

- A) informs you if your ancestor was a party in one or more cases during this period;
- B) lists the date and a few other details about each case (such as date of marriage or death, wife's maiden name, etc.); and
- C) provides you with the case number and date of each case.

Once you have the case numbers, you can then obtain the complete case records from the King County Court Clerk's office.

Anyone with ancestors who lived in King County, Washington between 1850 and 1980 should be aware of this index, which is not available anywhere else, other than in the King County Superior Court Clerk's office.

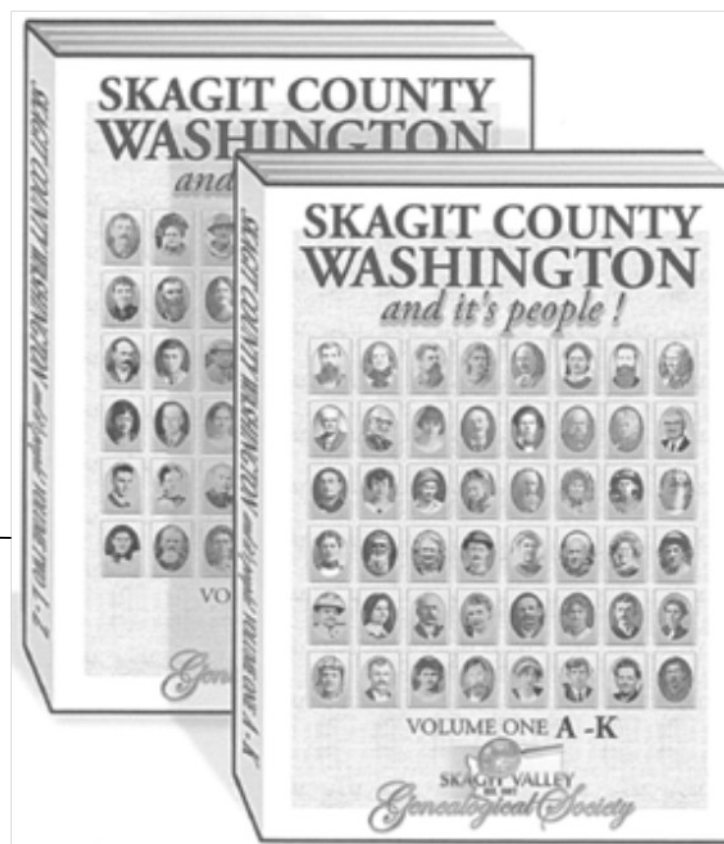

UPPER CANADA LAND PETITIONS (1763-1865) INTRODUCTION

on the internet <www.collectionscanada.gc.ca>]

Before the arrival of the Loyalists and British military settlers, the present-day Province of Ontario was an extension of the Province of Quebec. Following the Constitutional Act of 1791, the colony of Quebec was divided to create Upper Canada (today Ontario) and Lower Canada (today Quebec). Many early settlers, both military and civilian, submitted petitions to the Governor to obtain Crown land. Sons and daughters of Loyalists were also entitled to free lands.

The Upper Canada Land Petitions contain petitions for grants or leases of land and other administrative records. This research tool provides access to more than 82,000 references to individuals who lived in present-day Ontario between 1783 and 1865.

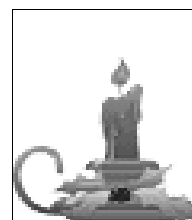
