Sat., January 14 – The Scandinavian Immigrant Experience – *Linda Duffield*

The Pacific Lutheran University (PLU) is home to the “Scandinavian Immigrant Experiences” Collection. The collection, stored in their Archives, is accessible for research in person or using an on-line database and includes oral interviews, taped conversations, and photographs. The presentation will inform and assist you in navigating access to documentation of the 282 immigrants interviewed by PLU students. At the end of the presentation, you should be able to use the online database, or visit the archives to retrieve pertinent information.

Library Report

Every now and then I come across a book that I just need to rave about. I've always been a bibliophile but taking up the hobby of genealogy has really exposed me to some very fine authors and print materials. Since SVGS is going to be hosting a seminar this spring on the theme "O Canada! Children of a Common Mother," I purchased for the SVGS collection a sorely needed resource book on the subject of French-Canadian Sources. In fact, that's the title of the book, *French-Canadian Sources: A Guide for Genealogists* compiled by several authors from the French-Canadian/Acadian Genealogists of Wisconsin.

The hardbound book is attractive, well organized and the material spot-on helpful. One aspect I appreciate is the inclusive of an image of a handwritten vital record, that is in French, but below the photograph of the document the author's wisely include the original French text and a side-by-side English translation. Oh, if all my German and Polish documents could be so nicely presented with a translation, now that would make life a whole lot easier.

And that's not all, the book has Appendices from A-H. Covering a dictionary of key French words for genealogists, addresses for libraries and archives in Canada, Charts of Canadian Census records, time lines, a bit of history...its incredibly comprehensive. Makes me wish I had some French-Canadian ancestors so I can regularly browse through its pages.

So, come visit the SVGS collection at the Burlington Library. The book is in the "Other Countries" section, in the Canada books area. You'll be delighted with the books helpful guidance.

Also, thanks to Carol Nersten for her donation of a book on the history of Clear Lake, Sharon Johnson for her donation of a British book on *Tracing Your Ancestors at the Public Records Office*, and to Dan Royal for his donation of two family history books on the "Bumpus", and "Thorp" families.

Remember, the 1st Saturday of the month (except holiday weekends such as July 4 and Labor Day), there is a genealogy volunteer stationed at the Burlington Library in the SVGS book section. Bring your questions and data and the volunteers will orient you to the collection and be of assistance.

For those of you who enjoy making New Year's Resolutions, here's one for you....include a regular visit to the SVGS collection to see what materials there may further your research. Good luck!

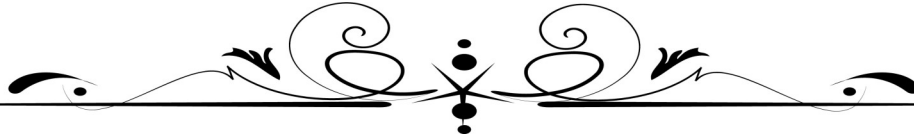

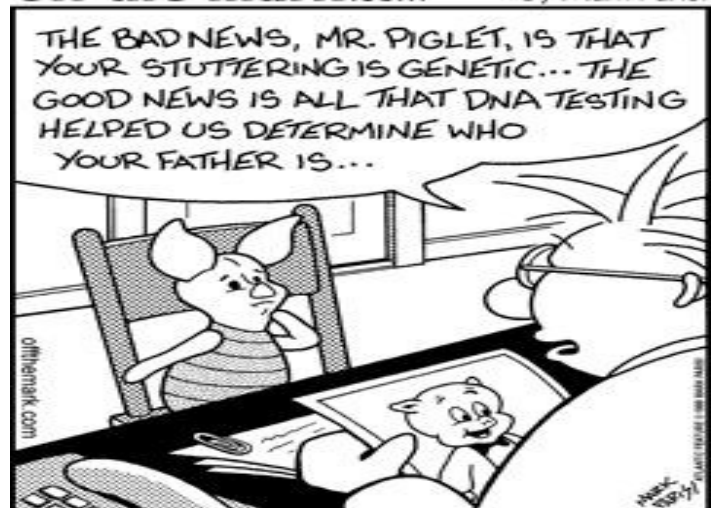

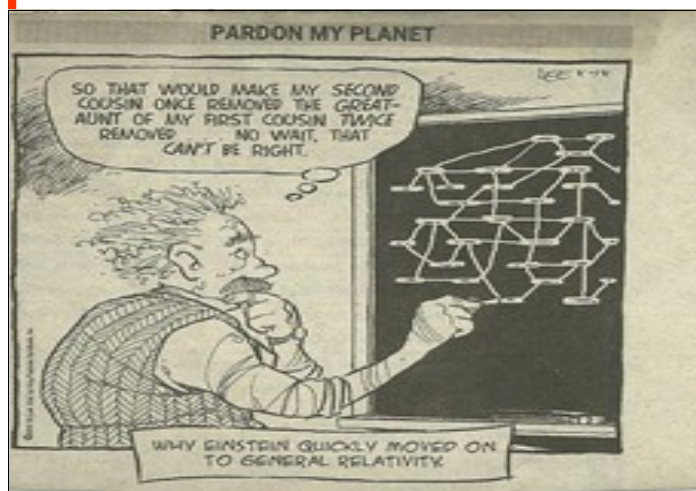

Genealogy's often misspelled words

Genealogy—No, it is not spelled “geneology” nor is it spelled in the manner I often see: “geneaology.” That last word looks to me as if someone thought, “Just throw all the letters in there and hope that something sticks.” For some reason, many newspaper reporters and their editors do not know how to spell this word, Don't they have spell checkers?

Cemetery— The letter “a” does not appear anywhere in the word “cemetery.” You can remember the spelling by an old saying, “We go to the cemetery with “E's.” (ease)

History— More than once have I seen someone refer to their “family history” or “family histry.”

Descendant— it often appears as descendent, descendent and many others.

Progenitor— I can never remember how to spell this word. I simply try to avoid it when I am writing.

Beginning in 1883, he devoted several years of his life to service at a government facility, finally taking leave to resume his dealings with the railroad. In 1887, he was a key player in a vital investigation run by the renowned Pinkerton Detective Agency. In 1889, Remus passed away during an important civic function held in his honor when the platform upon which he was standing collapsed.”

Connecting Past to Present Bringing the Family History to Life

The family was gathered in the living room, with lively chatter and laughter. The Christmas tree twinkled its merry comment as I slipped away.

In the backroom, my mother, Rita, helped transform me into a colonial puritan girl. I gathered my chart, and made my entrance.

This scene had really began years ago, when we had discovered that one of the family's ancestors was Mary Bradbury, one of the convicted witches of the famous Salem witch trials. Over the years I have gathered transcripts and copies of the pages of the old records pertaining to Mary's trial. Mary's story is a compelling glimpse of history and heritage.

My mother and I have sought to tell the family stories at family gatherings to give them a sense of their roots. Games and activities, including a photo booth, have been part of our Christmas celebration for several years. When I mentioned that I wanted to tell Mary's story in the form of a play, the idea evolved into a full production with colonial costumes for the photo booth. We scoured the shelves of thrift stores for costume parts and yards of fabric from old curtains, sheets and couch covers. We set about sewing and planning.

On Christmas day I stood amidst the colonial Christmas decorations of fruit, pineapple and swags of greenery with my chart in hand. We showed the lineage to Mary through many generations. As mom handed out the costumes the excitement and chatter rose.

We had been nervous about how the family would react to getting into costumes, but there was more excitement than trepidation as they put their costumes on, transforming into colonial ladies and gentlemen. Once gathered in the living room I handed out the scripts, and handed the magistrate his gavel. The trial began.

The Magistrate calls Mary Bradbury to the stand. "Mary Bradbury, you are charged with certain detestable arts called witchcraft, wickedly, maliciously, and feloniously practiced in the town of Andover in the county of..."
Mary Bradbury was seventy years old at the time of her trial, and in poor health. Rita, playing the matriarch of a large and well respected family, pleads her innocence, "I am a servant of Jesus Christ and have given myself to him as my only lord and savior, and am diligent in his service, in utter contempt and defiance of the devil..."

The testimony that follows gives insight into the deep superstitions of the times. Through the course of the play it becomes obvious that the evidence against Mary was solely based on the 'visions' of the accusers. At the time of the trials, there was an argument whether such evidence, called spectral evidence, should be allowed. Anyone could make such claims, and there was no way to refute the claims.

Indeed, Mary's accusers were from families that had long standing grudges against the Bradburys. A cameo of Mary and Thomas Bradbury brings to light the deep grudge the Carr family held against them, starting with Mary's refusal of George Carr's marriage proposal. Later, she had refused permission for her daughter, Jane, to marry John Carr, because she was too young to marry. John had become depressed, and then became ill and died. James Carr had also lost in love to one of Mary's sons as they had courted the same woman. Certainly the family's prosperity and connections to other prominent colonial families had given rise to envy and jealousy. The witch trials, reliant on spectral evidence, provided the atmosphere for old hatreds and grudges to churn to the surface as accusations fueled by the deep superstitions of the times.

The trial ends with Mary's conviction. The narrator tells how Mary, although convicted, was spared hanging. Her family and friends freed Mary and they fled to safety.

After the play was finished and the pictures taken, the family lingered for snacks and conversation. My mom and I were gratified by the number of conversations the play had spawned as they came to a greater understanding of their personal connection to history and the meaning imparted to the present. I was gratified that this was one family story that would not be forgotten on a page in my file.

Best Genealogy Search Websites of 2017

1. Ancestry-Pros/It has billions of records dating back to the turn of the millennium and including one of the most extensive collections of immigrations records. Cons/Subscription to access Ancestry’s services cost more than its competitors charge.
2. MyHeritage-Pros/MyHeritage strongly encourages getting your whole family involved with genealogy by offering kids games and easy family sharing. Cons/It doesn’t have Native American resources available.
3. FamilySearch-Pros/This genealogy website is free for anyone to use. Cons/ It does not provide DNA testing services.
4. Archives- Pros/ This family history search has a wide range of document types, including newspapers dating back to the 1700s. Cons/ Records only cover the U.S. and U.K. not even Canada or Australia are represented on Archives
5. Findmypast: Pros/has all of the crucial records we looked for in its database. Cons/ this site doesn’t offer much support outside of research articles or a FAQs section
6. OneGreatFamily- Pros/this site consistently evaluates sources for accuracy to avoid duplicates and incorrect reports. Cons/Material in the database depends on what members contribute. Any extra information has to come from an external link on the website.
7. Genealogy Bank -Pros/This is an excellent genealogy search engine for finding newspaper articles. Cons/The information focuses only on the United States
8. MyTrees-Pros/ It has distinct features like a professional genealogist directory data converter, family tree maker and learning center. Cons/Some sources that MyTrees taps into require you to subscribe to their databases, in addition to your MyTrees subscription, in order to access them
9. The Genealogical Research Library- Pros/Materials in this database are categorized geographically so it is easy to begin research into the places significant to your family history. Cons/The Genealogical Research Library is all about solo research so it doesn’t have extra features like family tree builders, DNA test or a community.

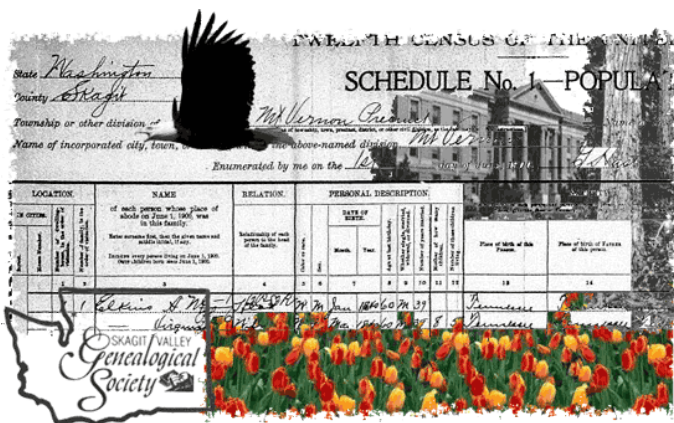

A Family of Witches Appear Before Our Eyes

BURLINGTON— A family accused of witchcraft and several townspeople appeared in court on Saturday, June 10, at 1:00 pm in Burlington. The trial took place at the Skagit Valley Genealogical Society's (SVGS) monthly meeting. Orchestrating the trial were actual descendants of the accused— Rita and Tessa Schulze. The jurors, composed of SVGS members and guests in attendance, also participated as the local townspeople booing and shouting in the "courtroom." The witch trial kept true to documented reports of the proceedings. "The experience of the witch trial conjured up a full spectrum of emotions— the fear and superstition of the community at that time in New England, sympathy for the innocent victims, and awe at how well the cast stayed true to the original transcript of the trial. In handmade costumes, family members told the true story of the ancestors with pride. This original program by the Schulze family was indeed an educational lesson in researching then honoring our ancestors. By presenting this program today in 2017, centuries later, one came away with a feeling that these innocent victims' names were finally cleared from the shame they endured at a mysteriously dark time in Salem, Massachusetts past. Bravo! Rita and Tessa you did a remarkable job. Thank you for sharing your family's compelling story with your fellow family history researchers.

MISSPELLINGS

Often, beginning genealogists miss their ancestors by sticking too firmly to the idea that “that’s not how my family spelled their name, so it can’t be my ancestor.”

This statement ignores these basic truths:

- 1) Ancestors who were illiterate would have no idea how to spell their own name, let alone how someone else should spell it.
- 2) Until the twentieth century, spelling rules were far more flexible and fluid than what we think of today. That was true for routine words, not just surnames.
- 3) Even if your family was highly educated and truly did feel strongly about how their name should be spelled — the record taker might not have been as concerned. Ultimately, it depends on *how the record creator chose to spell the name* — not what your family thought about how it should be spelled.
- 4) Human error happens.

Using as our starting point the recognition that our family members’ surnames may appear in records under a variety of spellings, let’s try to widen our net to explore how “misspellings” may occur, and how you can go about generating more alternate variations to aid in your search.

SOUND ALIKES

Many so-called “spelling errors” can be attributed to various ways of spelling the same sounds. Consider the following situations:

Even single letters can sound similar. Think about a time when you may have had to spell your name for someone on the telephone. How many of our letters sound similar when said? B, C, D, E, G, P, T are just some examples. Even if your ancestor was spelling their name for the record-creator, it might not have been heard and recorded correctly. Types of errors into three basic categories — “sound alike,” A favorite example I use to illustrate this point is the surname: Cole.

Cole, Coal, Coale, Kohl, Koehl, Kole, Koal.

Put an accent or variation on the pronunciation of this, and it can result in:

Cool, Coole, Call, Coyle, Coil, Cale, Caile, Goal, Gole, Golle, Kale, Koohl, Kile, Kyle. Undoubtedly there are more variations to this name than what I’ve listed above. “look alikes,” and simple human errors.

Gene-somnia: When you really should go to bed, but stay up and do genealogy instead.

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Christmas Letters Tell Family Stories

The first Christmas card was printed in 1843. Since then, many people send Christmas cards to their [family members](#) and friends every year. Some people take the time to sit down and write out a Christmas letter. Those letters tell family stories that might otherwise be forgotten.

A Christmas letter, as you may well know if you have ever received one, is much more detailed than a typical Christmas card. Some people will write Christmas letters that go on for several pages, while others manage to fit everything they wanted to say onto just one page. There are people who write their Christmas letters by hand, the “old fashioned” way. Others compose their Christmas letters on their computers and print out as many copies as they need to send to their loved ones.

The important thing about Christmas letters isn't the length, or the style. It is the stories that the letters contain. The end of the year Christmas letter often becomes a collection of the most significant moments that happened to a family since last Christmas.

In general, people share family stories that are amusing, or poignant, or unexpected. They talk about awards won, goals met, and happy blessings. Some people will also choose to talk about their health (including the surgery they had that year). That may be an uncomfortable thing to read about, but is, undoubtedly, the biggest thing on your relative's mind in the past year.

Yes, it can be annoying to read about every single award, soccer game, band recital, and precocious thing that your relative's children did in the past 12 months. Keep the Christmas letter anyway. Years from now, when those children are all grown up, they might find the old Christmas letters that their mother wrote to be absolutely fascinating!

A collection of Christmas letters, carefully stored away, can together tell quite the story about the people who were mentioned in the letter. Babies grow to be toddlers (who get into mischief). Little kids state exactly what they want to be when they grow up – only to change their minds several times before they get there. Petulant teenagers become thoughtful politically active college students.

A Christmas letter might be the only written source of short stories about a relative when he or she was young. Those stories, all pieced together, paint a picture of the relative's personality.

Take the time to enjoy the Christmas letters your family sends you. Scan them so you can have a digital copy that will not fade, tear, or be [damaged](#) from improper storage. Give [digital copies](#) to the genealogist in your [family tree](#).

The Story of Veterans Day

November 11 is Veterans Day. A veteran is a soldier who has served his/her country.

Thirty-five countries fought in World War I. They fought for five years, from 1914 to 1918. The United States fought in the war from 1917 to 1918.

Finally the countries stopped fighting. The leaders signed an armistice. They signed the armistice on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. The armistice meant that the war was over.

Americans were very happy to hear about the armistice. No more soldiers would die in the war. The soldiers could come home.

People went out into the streets and laughed and danced. They blew horns and whistles and rang bells. They sang songs. They thought that there would never be another war.

President Wilson made November 11 a holiday to remember the end of the war. The holiday was called Armistice Day.

At eleven o'clock in the morning, everyone stopped doing whatever they were doing. People were completely silent for one minute. This minute was to remember all the soldiers who have died in wars.

The body of an unknown soldier was brought to America from the cemetery in France. His body was buried in a tomb at Arlington National Cemetery. It was called the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

The US was in three more wars: World War II, the Korean War, and the Vietnam War. The name of the holiday was changed to Veterans Day.

The bodies of three more unknown soldiers were brought to the cemetery. On Veterans Day, there are special services at the Tomb of the Unknowns.

Americans remember and honor all the veterans.

Mary Tollefson was a teenager when the United States entered World War II and she was determined to be part of the war effort. However, her mother nixed the idea.

So, Mary did what she could on the home front and went to work for the phone company. There, she signed up for a new electronics course. She had only attended three sessions before getting hooked. She joined the service and became an electrician with the WAC, as well as a driver and mechanic. Mary learned computers and was eventually part of a team calculating trajectories.

What is the Tomb of the Unknowns?

The Tomb of the Unknowns is the tomb where unidentified soldiers who died in combat are laid to rest just outside of Washington, D.C. in the Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia. The first unidentified soldier, who had been killed in France, was buried there on November 11, 1921 until the completed tomb was dedicated on November 11, 1932.

Two other unidentified soldiers, one who perished fighting in World War II and the other who passed away serving during the Korean War, were also buried in the tomb. A fourth unknown soldier from the Vietnam War was entombed in the site in 1984, but was later removed once [DNA tests](#) identified him as Michael Blassie. Michael Blassie was a 24-year-old Air Force pilot shot down in May 1972 and was later disinterred and reburied
