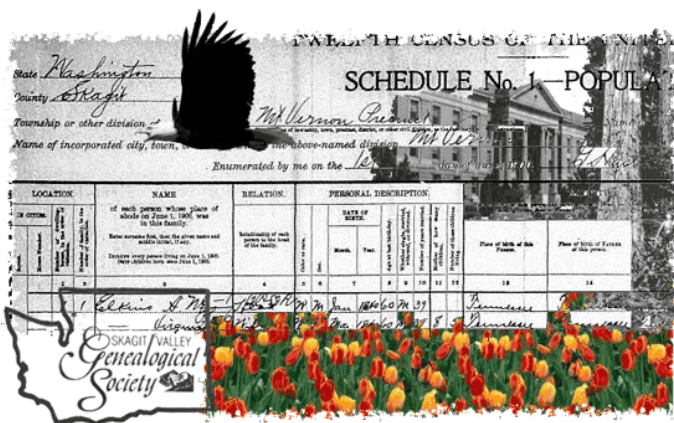
Did you know about this website? Ever looked at it? Suggest you do so!



13,200+ GENEALOGY LINKS ON FACEBOOK

Katherine R Willson, professional genealogist, has done for genealogy related pages and groups on Facebook what Cyndi Ingle, of the renowned *Cyndi's List*, has done for genealogy resources on the Internet. She compiled them into a searchable, clickable, comprehensive, very useful list.

Last updated in November 2018, Katherine's list, "Genealogy on Facebook", is 351 pages, contains 13,200+ Facebook genealogy links. The first 11 pages is a Table of Contents organized by geographical categories (states, countries, regions) and non-geographical categories (adoption, lineage societies, ethnicity, military conflicts, etc). One group named "Associated Daughters of Early American Witches", in the category of lineage societies, certainly piqued my interest.

Why join a Facebook genealogy related group?

A Facebook group is a place where people with common interests (for example-genealogy research in Allegan County, MI) can go to communicate, share ideas, and ask questions. You are more likely to solve your Allegan County brick wall by networking with genealogists actually in Allegan County.

Our Seattle Genealogical Society Networking Group recently accepted a new member from Norway. He was trying to find descendants of his great-grandfather who immigrated to Seattle from Norway. The family in Norway lost contact with the Seattle family more than 30 years ago. Within the day, several group members came up with data, including obituaries, to help him, and he was able to establish contact with his US cousins.

Here's the link to Katherine's list, "Genealogy on Facebook". See what groups might be of interest and help to you. Also, which groups might you help? As genealogists we love to dig in to help a fellow genealogist solve their mystery; it's just in our DNA.

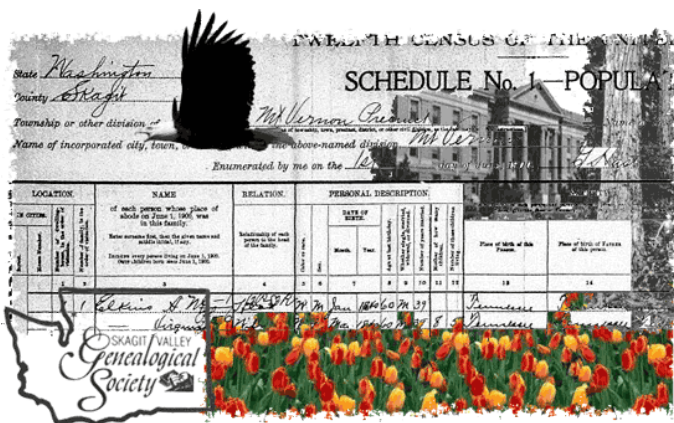

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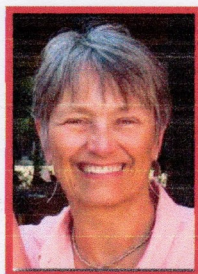

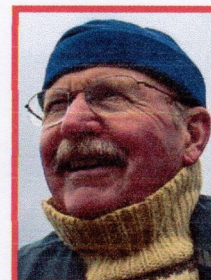

PayPal Instructions

Recently people have become confused when using PayPal for seminar registration. Here are step by step instructions for registering for the Nordic Roots 2019 seminar.

On the PayPal Registration bar select either SVGS member, Non-member or After March 16 by clicking on Add to Cart.

That will take you to a shopping cart page similar to the one listed below. You should see your selection and the amount. If you are registering for two, be sure the quantity box outlined in blue is 2.

To go back to the SVGS website to make another selection for Lunches, click on Continue Shopping outlined in green.

By clicking on Add to Cart for your lunch selection, you will be returned to the Shopping cart.

You should see new totals reflecting your choices. When you see the amount you expect to be paying, you will then CheckOut.

DO NOT check the yellow PayPal Check out tab unless you have a PayPal account.

In order to pay with your credit card not using PayPal account, you need to click on the white tab Check Out outlined in the red box.

Yes, you have to complete the information that PayPal requests of you on the PayPal Guest Checkout page. Yes, they will try to get you to create a PayPal account. You don't have to.

When you are successful, you will get an email sent to you from PayPal and an email will be sent directly to our treasurer. If our treasurer does not receive a PayPal email of payment confirmation, you will be contacted.

We hope this description helps to make PayPal payment a less stressful and productive experience.

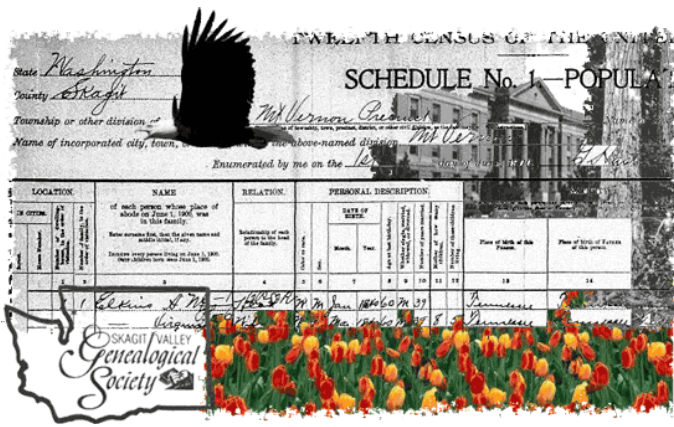

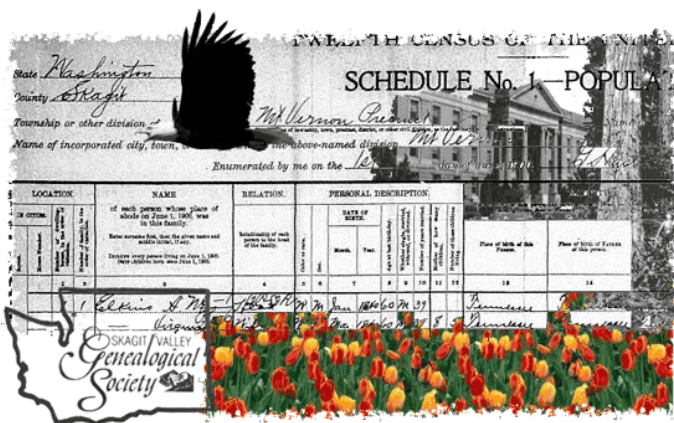

Changes to the SVGS Library, One-on-One Consultations Now Available By Appointment:

The Skagit Valley Genealogical Society (SVGS) as of August 1st is making changes to its scheduling of volunteers and research assistance offerings. Previously, SVGS provided volunteers once a month at the Burlington Public Library to offer an orientation to SVGS' book collection and point out the various materials and resources available in the collection and at the library, such as Ancestry.com Library Edition.

SVGS is experimenting, for one year, to see how it goes, with a different form of assisting visitors to the library collection. SVGS will now offer one-on-one research assistance by a genealogy volunteer on a by-appointment basis. Any genealogy researcher, SVGS member or not, regardless of one's level of experience, may schedule a one-on-one session with an SVGS genealogy library volunteer. The volunteer will offer genealogy research assistance, as well as, give an orientation to the SVGS book collection and its numerous resources.

In the event that no volunteer is available or found to assist at the level of expertise needed to help the individual making the request, then that individual will be referred to the SVGS Genealogist/Researcher for further follow-up. A nominal fee for this more in-depth level of assistance may be necessary to cover any documentation or copying costs.

New to SVGS?

Here are 6 genealogical terms that can be confusing when you first encounter them

Ahnentafel chart

A table that lists the name and date and place of birth, marriage, and death for an individual and specified number of his or her ancestors. The first individual on the list is number one, the father is number two, the mother is number three, the paternal grandfather is number four, the paternal grandmother is number five, and so forth. Ahnentafel is a German word meaning ancestor chart or ancestor table. This chart is also called a continental pedigree.

Census enumeration district

The geographic area assigned to one census taker, who was known as an enumerator. The size of the enumeration district depended on the number of people living in the area. The enumerator was responsible to collect information about every person in the district on a specific night. Several enumeration districts make up a section of the census known as a census piece or bundle.

Hereditary society

An organization in which membership is based on descent from an individual who served during a particular military conflict; participated in a certain patriotic cause; immigrated from a particular country; was a founder or pioneer of a state; had royal, noble, or baronial lineage; had a particular occupation; or lived during a particular time period. Also called a lineage society.

Marriage bond

A written guarantee or promise of payment made by the groom or another individual to ensure that a forthcoming marriage would be legal.

PERiodical Source Index (PERSI)

A bibliography of articles appearing in genealogical periodicals and an index to the people and topics covered in the articles.

Tithable

An individual who is subject to a tax.

World War II Nose Art

During WWII, members of the United States Army Air Forces (USAAF) flew countless missions in aircraft adorned with art on the fuselage. Although not specifically sanctioned by military officials, the practice of painting and personalizing aircraft was widely popular and seen as a way to boost morale. The images were painted both by hired professionals and enlisted soldiers who were amateur artists. The paintings were usually found near the nose of the aircraft and are known as nose art.

Bomber crews developed tight bonds with one another and with their aircraft. Everyone knew the dangers of bombing runs, and each mission brought the possibility that it could be the last. Nose art was a safe way to bring a bit of levity and comradery to the stresses of war. These paintings often featured good luck images, names of loved ones or towns back home, pin-up girls, and cartoon characters.

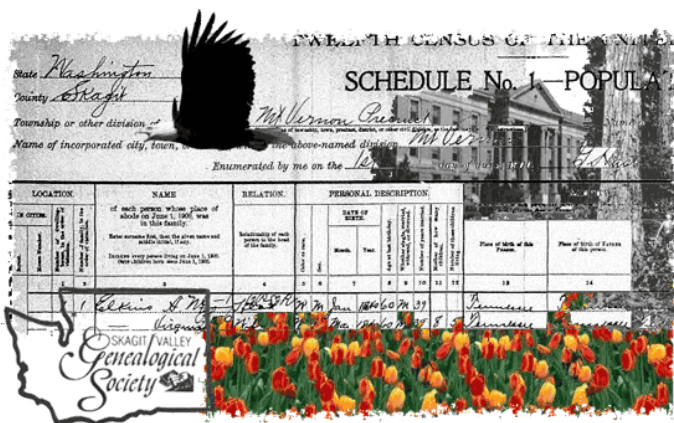

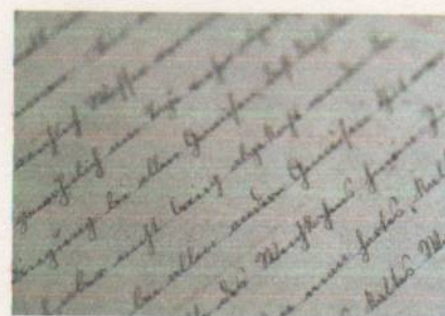

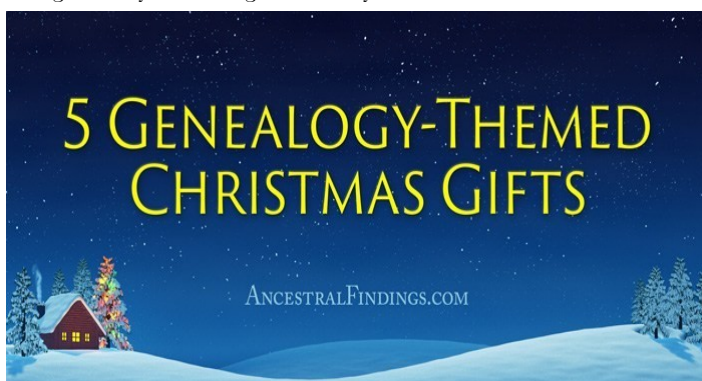

Are you looking for genealogy-themed Christmas gifts to give this year? Here are five that won't cost much money to make, but that your relatives will adore.

1. A Family Tree Chart with Photos

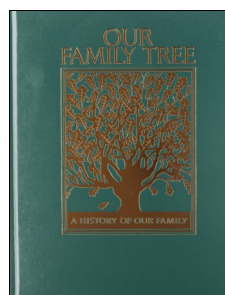
There are all kinds of family tree charts you can use for free located online. Use a type that has room to put a person's name, birth and death dates (marriage dates are nice, too, if there's space), and a photo. Using photos, you may only be able to go back three or four generations. However, if you are creative and can tape two or four family tree charts together in a configuration that makes them look like one, you can go back farther in time.

2. An Ancestor Photo Cube



You can get a plastic photo cube at most craft stores. Use it as an any-time decoration or put a hook in it and use it as a Christmas tree ornament. The cube has six sides. Put a photo of each set of your grandparents on opposite sides. The other four sides can be used for photos of your great-grandparents since you have four sets of those. If you don't have photos of one or more sets of great-grandparents, use photos of great-great-grandparents, or siblings of your grandparents and/or great-grandparents. Be sure to label each photo on the cube.

3. A Family History Book



You can buy books where you can add your family history details on a person-by-person basis. Paste in a photo if you have one, and write down all the statistics and personal details and stories you know about that person. Use one branch of your family and give copies of the book to each person with a connection to that branch.

4. The Gift of Research

Put together a family history of a line that isn't yours. This could be the line from the other side of a cousin's family tree, for example, or the genealogy of an aunt or uncle who is only related to you by marriage. They will love it, and love you for doing this special thing for them.

5. A Family History Video

Put a photo montage together of one particular branch of your family, starting with the oldest photos you have, up to the present generation. Use photo editing or montage software to space how many seconds you want each photo to show in your video. Put a meaningful song behind it all, and time the photos so the last one shows just as the song is ending. Burn it to DVD, put it in a jewel case with a nice home-made cover that indicates what it is, and give it to all members of the family with a link to that line.



Walking in Their Footsteps

Lynn and I have always wanted to visit Norway where both our ancestors lived. This year was finally the time to do it. We did not have family connections but knew from our genealogy studies where we wanted to go. His family came from Aure and Kristiansund Norway. Mine were from Liabo and Halså Norway. We learned that they were within travel distance of each other. Prior to leaving I was able to connect with a 3rd cousin from Lillehammer and she agreed to meet me in Aure. This trip was a dream of a lifetime and hopefully I would be able to walk on the land of my ancestors.

We arrived in Aure on August 6th and entered the town (Kommune) through a tunnel. The first thing we saw was a church and a cemetery. We, of course, stopped and discovered many Torsets residing there! We talked with a woman who was caring for a gravesite and asked where the Guesthouse was and she pointed to a building on the hill. We did not disturb her work, but left to check into our room. At check-in we talked to the receptionist and asked about where the Torset farm was located. She said it was down the road a bit, so we took off to find it. Heading east a short distance from the Guesthouse we crossed a bridge and right away I noticed the TORSET name engraved on a stone in the bridge. (I had once seen this brick on the Internet at someone's Geo cash hike.) We stopped and took pictures and then went on. Finding the farm was not easy as there were no signs and we did not have any references so we returned to the cemetery to search headstones. The woman we talked to earlier had left but we met the pastor and he agreed to meet with us on Thursday. This meeting was later canceled as the Vicar was arriving and therefore we were unable to obtain any church records.

On the evening of the 7th we met up with my 3rd cousin, Gunn Iren and had dinner with her and her husband. The following day we were heading to Liabo. This time it was my ancestor's home to see. We followed Gunn Iren and she took us to her 1st (and my 3rd) cousin's home. I was so excited to meet Kari as she too has the "Olson" curly hair! Her daughter Kristin came out and she too had curly hair, and we were all wearing it in the same style! Kari said her son has curly hair too but he was not home that day. Kari had coffee, tea and lefsa for us while we visited. Then Kari informed me that I met her sister at the church graveyard the day before. She said her sister knew I was the one coming to visit because of my hair! After leaving their home, Gunn Iren took us to meet her aunt Dordi. She did not speak English so Gunn was able to translate. Aunt Dordi also had my curly hair, but wore it the way my grandmother and Aunt Arlene used to wear theirs. We had a wonderful visit, and just as we were leaving she gave me a hand drawn family tree written in Norwegian! This tree shows my Great grandfather's siblings, parents and grandparents – all of which I did not know prior to joining Skagit Genealogy. My great grandfather and his brothers and sister who went to America are branches that say "To Amerika." We drove on to Liabo to meet up with Ralph Sandvig who lives in the home of my Olson ancestors. He spoke a little English and was able to share some information. It was really nice to walk on the land where my great-grandfather grew up and look at the view over the fjord and the small town. We did not have time to find the church and cemetery this trip but I plan to return and make more connections again 2021. We returned to our Guesthouse to research the Torsets some more. The following day we drove over the Torset Bridge and stopped and talked with some people that lived near there. One lady pointed out the Torset farm on the hill and we headed over there. We met an elderly man whose name was Paul Torset. He did not speak English but we were able to communicate that we also were Torsets. In the meantime the receptionist at the Guesthouse had found more information on Lynn's grandfather's family and told us where to go on the Northwest side. The Torset farm was located on the far side of the bridge. No one was home but as we were leaving a car pulled up the driveway. A young lady said that this was the Torset farm. She took my phone number and said she would talk with her mother and get back to us. That evening we were looking through a book they had at the Guesthouse and there was an article in Norwegian written by Ivar Torset and a picture of another bridge named Torsetsundbro. This bridge was a one-way bridge over the Torset sound in the Norwest section. That night Aashild called and said that Lynn's great-grandmother, Gjertrud Larsdatter Torset grew up on their farm. She married John Iversen Maele who lived 4 km down the road. They had a son Lars Johnsen Torset born in 1886. We left the Guesthouse that morning and drove over the one-way Torsetsundbro and took pictures of the Torset farm. We drove further down the road but did not find the place where Lars grew up. We now have connections so in the future we can make the trip and meet with more relatives.

It was wonderful to walk the streets in the towns and on the land where our ancestors once lived.
