"In the Meantime"

Washington State Senate Bill 5403, Limiting Disclosure of Birth Certificates, would have severely limited access to birth certificates, but in coordination with the Washington Department of Health, we were able to get a substitute bill, SSB5403, through the Senate Health & Long-term Care Committee. SSB5403 includes provisions for unrestricted access to a birth certificate after the death of the registrant.

SSB5403 was sent to Ways & Means Committee on March 2, but was not processed through committee prior to the March 7 legislative cutoff. The bill will have to be reintroduced during next year's legislative session.

By next January, the new rules for protection of birth records are scheduled to be issued by the Federal Department of Health under Public Law 108-458, Section 7211, and we will be able to adjust SSB5403 to counteract or mitigate any new restrictions the Public Law imposes.

In the meantime, the process for obtaining Washington State birth certificates remains the same as in the past, without unnecessary restrictions.

So Why Lock Up the Birth Records?

It seems that every week we hear of one more situation in which some politician or bureaucrat is trying to restrict access to public domain vital records. Everybody is trying to lock out everyone, including genealogists. Our right to access to public domain birth, marriage, and death information is being threatened constantly under the guise of "preventing identity theft." Balderdash! (That's as strong a word as I will use in this family-oriented publication.)

I am sure that the politicians love the limelight back home when they can brag that they have taken action to "prevent identity theft." Heck, nobody is in favor of identity theft, right? Therefore, just proclaiming to have taken some token action under the smoke screen of "preventing identity theft" is sure to win a few more votes in the next election.

"Facts? What facts? Don't bother me with facts, I've got a reelection campaign to win."

Well, now a new study has provided genealogists with some hard facts. These facts should serve as pinpricks to any inflated claims of preventing something that never existed.

A new survey of 4,000 consumers, about 500 of whom were identity theft victims, was recently conducted by Javelin Research and the Better Business Bureau for CheckFree, Visa, and Wells Fargo Bank. This study is based on cold, hard facts, not the rhetoric or conjecture of someone who makes pronouncements not grounded in reality.

According to the people who were victims of identity theft, here are the eight most common sources:

Lost or stolen wallet: 29%

Fraud that occurs during an in-store or telephone transaction: 12.9%

Corrupt employees: 9% Stolen mail: 8%

Spyware on the computer: 5% Sifting through garbage: 2.6% Computer viruses: 2.2%

"Phishing" through fraudulent e-mail: 1.7%

Take a close look at the above. Please note the rating for "obtained a record from the vital records department." Do you see it? I don't. The full report is quite lengthy. Here are a few other random facts extracted from the Better Business Bureau's announcement:

Among cases where the perpetrator's identity is known, half of all identity fraud is committed by a friend, family member, relative, neighbor or in-home employee - someone known by the victim.

A wide variety of metrics confirm that identity fraud problems are NOT worsening. In fact, the total number of victims is declining. The number of identity fraud victims dropped from 10.1 million in 2003 to 9.3 million in 2004. The median value of identity fraud crimes remained unchanged at \$750; however most identity fraud victims incurred no out-ofpocket costs.

The next time someone claims that access to public records needs to be restricted in order to "reduce identity theft," let's ask an embarrassing question: "Show me some proof." Then, in the awkward silence that follows, let's ask that person to read the facts as proven by the Javelin Research and the Better Business Bureau report. Here's a bit of advice to politicians and bureaucrats: please focus on real issues where there is a demonstrated need. Otherwise, someone may just deflate your balloon. My thanks to Peter Parkhurst for alerting me to the results of this new study.

Booth hurt the reconstruction efforts for the Southern states, that Lincoln would have carried out with much more generous terms than came to pass following his death. *Ya Gotta Wonder!*

Dan Johnson, R.I.P.

Dan Johnson, noted New Brunswick genealogy author and publisher, has died.

Willis D. Hamilton, Professor Emeritus, University of New Brunswick wrote to the New Brunswick general email list that he had recently met with Dan. Willis had the privilege of being involved in the bestowing of the 1996 Award of Merit to Dan by the American Society for State and Local History: "I was acquainted with Dan for most of the 23 years in which he was involved in the production of the VITAL STATISTICS FROM NEW BRUNSWICK NEWSPAPERS. I was a subscriber to the series and received my copy of the last volume (#102) only a day or two ago. From an early point, I was impressed by the usefulness of Dan's work, not only to genealogists, but to biographers, historians, and cultural researchers as well. ..."

For those who are not aware of Dan's work, Dan himself wrote a New Year's update just a few short weeks ago - "... The project to extract Vital Statistics From New Brunswick Newspapers enters its 23rd year of publication. Last fall a C.D. was produced containing an index to the first 100 volumes of this work.

The C.D. was introduced as an additional service and does not replace the SAE search and extract service. ... By the end of 2004, 101 Volumes of Vital Statistics From New Brunswick Newspapers have been printed encompassing the years 1784 to 1895. The reference departments of the P.A.N.B. and many N.B. libraries will provide assistance in look-ups if provided the volume and entry numbers contained in the C.D. I am looking forward to next year with the hopes that the Newspapers of 1896 will reveal some genealogical treasure. To all of you Best Wishes For a New Year! Danny "

From Ye Editors Desk: My earliest foray into finding my Irish ancestry was based on the Wedding Certificate which had my greatgrandparents (who married in 1907)Thomas Royals parents both of Irish descent, born in New Brunswick. In 1996 I hired Dan Johnson to find anyone named Royal from 1800 to when my Thomas was born in 1870 (Thomas was born in Wisconsin). He found a death notice for a Barnard Royal in 1846 and a female. Neither looked right to me at the beginning stages as a genealogist and I filed away. Dan had also refunded the \$10.00 fee I had sent him as he felt he wasn't able to find me much. Last year I found Thomas Royals father Owen Royal in the 1851 Census for New Brunswick and when the family came into New Brunswick from the mother country of Ireland. Turning to tax records and school returns for the township of Newcastle in the county of Northumberland, N.B. after their arrival in 1830 I found Barnard Royal with his children; Thomas, Owen, Catherine and Bridgett. The original spelling of their name was RYAL. Fun and exciting stuff to find out and share with my grandfather and his two living siblings and extended Royal family.

I was ready to return Dan Johnson his \$10.00 and the findings on my family, regrettably it won't be to him personally. **Dan Royal** For more on the story: http://www.stumpranchonline.com/Royal

Donations make up a very large part of our SVGS Library collection. If you want to donate items please let me know and I will see if there is already a copy in the holdings. Space considerations are a major factor in acquiring new books. New books to our library donated by members are as follows:



The Palatine Families of New York 1710 by Henry Z. Jones, Jr. Vol. 1 & 2 Subtitled, A Study of German Immigrants Who Arrived in Colonial New York in 1710, These two volumes contain the author's story of the Palatines, his interest in doing this project, illustrations as well as an alphabetized listing of persons and German places. They are in excellent condition and are located in the New York section of our library.

The Alsace Emigration Book Volume 2, compiled by Cornelia Schrader-Muggenthaler. This book lists towns and villages in Upper and Lower Alsace, Germany, Swiss and Austria, also maps important to this

time period as well as the list of emigrants. This book, also in excellent condition, will be found in the Other Countries - France section of our library.

America: An illustrated Diary of its Most Exciting Years. The editors of this slim volume feel "the period from 1914 through 1960 is perhaps the most significant" in U.S. history, and have gathered sights through the use of black & white photographs and moods of this country using articles written by people of those times. This book will give the reader a slice of what life was like during that time, as well as the clothing styles and is located in the reference section of our library.

Also in the reference section is a slim, oversized volume produced by the Associated Press about the final days of President John F. Kennedy.

"The Torch is Passed..." profusely illustrated in black and white and, according to the editor, "not to revive shock and tears, but to remember" those four days in November, 1963.

A big thank you goes to Laura Kennedy and Pat Grisotti for these contributions.

Also new in our library are recent issues of the **Genealogy Bulletin from Heritage Creations**. These have identified State Censuses and Substitutes listing all states east of the Mississippi. This last issue, #66 December 2004, includes states of the Central Plains - Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska; and Dakota Territory, North and South Dakota. These are located in the top drawer of the file cabinet #2 in a folder marked Genealogy Bulletin.

New to the Traveling Library is a set of CD's on Family Tree Maker so, a big thank you to **Lois Theodoratus** for her donation.

member of the U.S. Army.


