NGS NEWS RELEASE - 12 January 2004

By now you may have heard that in December 2003 the current Board of Directors of the National Genealogical Society released a statement announcing changes in the board. After accepting the resignations of the president, treasurer, and secretary, the remaining board members elected new officers and formed new committees.

It is important that everyone know that these actions were not taken lightly. Despite the board's initial confidence in a new management structure, a majority of the board came to be concerned about its effects on our organization. At the mid-November board meeting financial statements were not shared with the whole board. Then during the last week of November 2003 the board discovered for the first time that over a period of less than four months, NGS's investments had been depleted from nearly \$500,000 to approximately \$50,000.

Skagit County Families Remembered

The Skagit Valley Genealogical Society wishes to remember for posterity in a special edited obituary section the recently deceased and/or their family who came to Skagit County at least 30-50 years ago. Where we can find their family (paternal or maternal) in any source- such as census reports; from the 1885 Washington Territory Skagit Co. Census to the recently released 1930 U.S. Census for Skagit Co.; 1906 Snohomish/Skagit History book; - we will add in the last paragraph. This will also help us with our special ongoing book project on Skagit Pioneers.

William C. "Bill" Newberg passed away Dec. 3, 2003, in Reno, Nevada, at the age of 92. He was born Dec. 17, 1910, in Seattle to Charles J. and Anna E. Newberg.

In 1911 the Newberg family moved from Seattle to a forty-acre farm east of Sedro-Woolley. It was on this farm where Bill grew up; he then attended Utopia grade school and Sedro-Woolley Union High School, graduating in the class of 1929.

At the urging of his mother, he enrolled at the University of Washington in Seattle. As the family had very little money, he knew that he would have to work his way through school if he wanted to get an education, though he had saved some money working in the woods. Although the country was now in a deep depression, he was able to find part time jobs, which eventually got him through the University, graduating in the class of 1933 with a degree in mechanical engineering.

One of the many jobs Bill had while going to the University was buying and selling new and used cars and he soon acquired a love for the automobile industry. After graduating, and with the degree in his hand, he headed to the motor city of Detroit, Michigan, where he soon landed a job with Chrysler as a driver and mechanic in the road-testing department.

Later he went on to the Chrysler Institute of Engineering where he earned his masters degree in automotive engineering in 1935. This gave him the opportunity to learn not only the manufacturing side of the automobile industry, but also the

sales and marketing side, which would greatly help him in the years to come as he moved up in the management ranks of the Chrysler Corporation. In 1939, Bill married Dorothy Beck of

Grose Point, Michigan, who would become his shining star for the next 64 years.

When World War II broke out, Chrysler was asked by the government to be one of the prime contractors in Chicago to build the engines for the yet to be built B-29 Superfortress. Chrysler selected Bill to be the chief engineer. After the war, Chrysler promoted him to be vice president of the Airtemp Heating and Air Conditioning division.

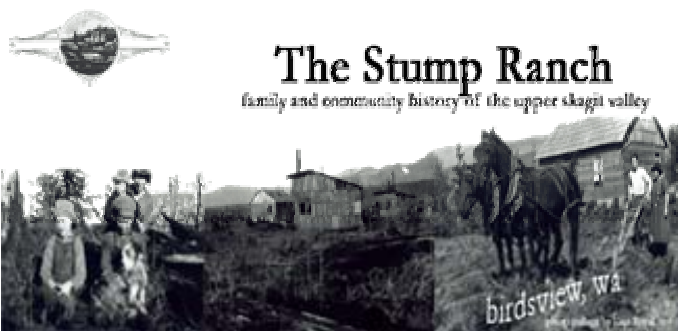
Then in 1947 he was promoted to division president. During the late 1940s he also served as a consultant to the Atomic Energy Commission. In 1950 he went back to Detroit as vice president of the Dodge division of Chrysler. In 1951 he was promoted to division president. In 1954 he was honored to be chosen to drive the pace car at the Indianapolis 500 motor speedway. Then in 1956 he was given added responsibilities as group vice president for all Chrysler automotive divisions. And in 1958 he was promoted to executive vice president, then later to company president.

Bill was also instrumental in bringing Lawrence Welk to national television in the early 1950s and he was a good friend of Roy Rogers, Dale Evans and Danny Thomas, as Dodge sponsored their television programs. In 1956, he received the Most distinguished Alumnus of the Year award from the University of Washington.

In the 1960s, Bill retired from the automobile industry to pursue other interests. In 1974, he moved his family from Detroit, Michigan, to Reno, Nevada, where he resided until his death. Though he left the Sedro-Woolley area many years ago, he never lost his strong personal ties to his family, friends and to the community where he grew up.

Bill was preceded in death by his father and mother, Charles and Anna Newberg; sisters Gladys M. Day of Seattle and Mary A. Hoyt of Sedro-Woolley. Bill was a beloved husband, father and grandfather who is survived by his wife Dorothy of Reno; daughter Judy (Tom)... of Cambridge, Massachusetts; sons Bob (Lisa), Jim (Cynthia) and Bill Jr. (Kari); five grandchildren, one great grandson, one niece, Viola... of Lynnwood, Washington, and one nephew, Ed Hoyt of Sedro-Woolley.

Mary Albertine Trueman McDougle, 101, a lifetime resident of the Lyman community, passed away on Tuesday, January 6, 2004 at her home surrounded by her loving family and caregivers.

She was born on October 11, 1902 in Lyman, WA, the fourth of eight children of Alf & Mary Albertine, who were early settlers of the Lyman area.

Mary graduated from Sedro-Woolley High School in 1922, after which she worked as a switchboard operator for the Lyman Telephone Co. She also wrote weekly articles for the Courier Times on happenings in the Lyman area. She also worked on the election board for several years.

On October 8, 1924 she married William Trueman, and from that marriage her 3 children were born. William passed away in 1936. On February 5, 1949 she married Cecil McDougle. Cecil passed away in 1986. She was also preceded in death by her parents; 2 sisters, Della & Frances; 5 brothers, Frank, Hank, Fritz, Ernie & Alfred; and a grandson, Larry Trueman.

Mary is survived by her 3 sons and their spouses... and numerous grand, great-grand and great-great-grandchildren, nieces and nephews.
